Steve Barclay MP has been appointed as Health Secretary, and we have welcomed him in his new role. James Morris MP takes up post as Parliamentary Under Secretary of State.

Celebrating our 60th Anniversary

I was delighted to welcome College Fellow and former Deputy Chief Medical Officer of England, Professor Sir Jonathan Van-Tam, who delivered our Foundation lecture for our 60th Anniversary.

Professor Sir Jonathan Van-Tam's lecture, *Lessons learnt during the COVID-19 pandemic and his contribution to the UK Vaccines Taskforce and the Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation*, was a fascinating and illuminating overview of what it was like to be at centre of one of the biggest health crises to face the NHS.

Despite moving the lecture online at short notice, there were over 200 attendees ensuring a lively and engaging question and answer session.

I would also like to thank <u>Aiforia</u>, the sponsor of our Named College Lecture Series, which included our Foundation lecture. The lecture is <u>available on the</u> <u>College website</u>.

College Diamond Jubilee – regional events To mark the College Jubilee, the College's <u>Wales</u> <u>Regional Council led by Dr Jonathan Kell, Chair,</u> organised <u>a walk along the Wales Coastal Path</u>.

Walks took place all around the coast with the South Wales walk starting at Barry Island, via Sully and Penarth Pier and finishing at the Welsh parliament, the Senedd. We were delighted that the Mayor of Penarth, Cllr Laura Rochefort, joined us between Penarth and Cardiff Bay to celebrate our Diamond Jubilee. Thank you to all the walkers on different stretches of the Welsh Coastal Path including Dr James Davies MP (Conservative, Vale of Clwyd), who joined the walk from Prestatyn to Rhyl with a group from the Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board.

The Council also hosted a lecture at the Senedd with Dr Meena Upadhyaya OBE on Tuesday 14 June. Meena gave a talk on the challenges she has faced in her career, coming from a minority background. Meena also described the advances made in the fields of genetics during her career. We were especially thankful to Senedd Member, Vaughan Gething, who sponsored and attended the lecture.

The events provide a great template to promote pathology not only in Wales but for the UK as a whole.

We will also be working with Meena to develop our work on diversity and inclusion. We are also keen to hear from others and develop ideas and suggestions around this important work programme.

Ellie has helped us highlight pathology and healthcare issues, especially around workforce and investment and we are very grateful for the support given by Ellie and her team.

RCPath/Specialist Society Medical Elective small grant scheme

The College is delighted to announce a new RCPath/Specialist Society Medical Elective small grant scheme, launched to mark the College's Diamond Jubilee.

The scheme is jointly funded by the College and partner societies and will offer grants of up to \pounds 1,000. The grants will help to support undergraduate medical and veterinary students who wish to undertake electives in pathology disciplines.

Electives may be clinical or research-based and may be undertaken in any part of the world.

A minimum of £500 must be used for student travel and subsistence with the remaining amount being spent flexibly for project-related costs such as consumables, or for student costs, as appropriate for the project. <u>Applications for this year are now open.</u> The closing date is Friday 9 September 2022. Successful candidates will be informed in October 2022.

Not in the textbooks study day - Virtual Meeting

RCPATH workshop: CNS tumour WHO 2021 and methylation profiling – update

recommendations

Friday 30 September 2022 CPD Credits: 6

This one-day workshop will provide a detailed update on the changes in the CNS tumour WHO 2021 classification covering diagnostic aspects of adult and paediatric brain tumours. The workshop will also address the advances in methylation profiling of intrinsic tumours as well as meningiomas. The workshop will be complemented by an interactive practical session where participants will have the opportunity to discuss the diagnostic approaches using CNS WHO 2021 classification and methylation profiling. The cases included in the interactive session will be available to view in a digital format prior, during and after the workshop for registered participants.

The target audience for this workshop are neuropathologists, pathologists, neurooncologists, neurosurgeons, neuroscientists and other healthcare professionals involved in adult and paediatric brain tumour diagnostics, treatment, or research

Medical examiner training

The College is the <u>lead medical royal college for medical examiners</u> and provides training for any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner. Participants will need to complete mandatory 26 e-learning modules and attend an entire face-to-face training day to receive a certificate of completion. The day includes short presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience. Medical examiner training is open only to medically qualified individuals who work in England and Wales.

New medical examiners who successfully complete the training and the e-learning modules will be invited to join the College as members.

Medical examiner officer training

The College also leads on the training of medical examiner officers (MEOs).

MEOs work closely with medical examiners and undertake tasks such as coordinating the completion of death certificates and referrals to the coroner, and speaking to clinicians and bereaved families.

MEOs may come from a wide range of backgrounds. For example, nurses, healthcare scientists or bereavement officers although this list is not exhaustive. More information, including a model job description, is on the College website.

The face-to-face training day is the second part of MEO training. Everyone attending the course must have completed the 26 mandatory core e-learning modules before the date of the course to get the most out of the training day. The e-learning modules <u>can be accessed</u> <u>here</u>. (Registration with e-Learning for Healthcare is required.)

News from external organisations

Supporting medical colleagues in Ukraine – One-day symposium – 13 August

The German Division of the International Academy of Pathology has organised a one-day symposium to raise funds to support medical colleagues in Ukraine. All participation fees from the event will be used for medical care and diagnostics. College members who would like to attend the conference on Saturday 13 August can see the programme and register via the College website and can self-accredit for the full 6 CPD credits.

Polio – UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA)

The UKHSA, working with the Medicines and Healthcare Products Regulatory Agency (MHRA), has found poliovirus in sewage samples collected from the London Beckton Sewage Treatment Works. Wastewater surveillance is being expanded to assess the extent of transmission and identify local areas for targeted action.

Healthcare professionals have been alerted by the UKHSA to these findings so they can promptly investigate and report anyone presenting with symptoms that could be polio, such as paralysis. For more information visit: <u>UKHSA website</u>.

New National Cancer Data from National Disease Registration Service available for pathologists to use

The Get Data Out programme from the National Disease Registration Service released new data on Thursday 28 April.

This includes new detailed statistics on Routes to Diagnosis and survival for cancer patients diagnosed between 2013 and 2018, for all 14 of current GDO cancer sites, plus a new GDO cancer site 'Skin tumours'.

2013–2019 incidence data will also be released for the new GDO cancer site 'Skin tumours'. Data available <u>here</u>.
