President's Message

Winter is coming...

Already we are seeing considerable pressure on the NHS, with peaks in both new variants of COVID-19 and flu emerging – the importance of ensuring high uptakes of vaccines in the vulnerable needs to be reinforced.

Meanwhile, resident doctors in England have just announced another series of 5-day strikes beginning next month – add to this the threat of strike action by Foundation Year doctors over a lack of job opportunities, which will all put additional pressure on the delivery of care to patients. We would urge the Government and the BMA to resolve these disputes with great urgency.

The Medical Training Review

The Medical Training Review Phase 1 Report was published on Friday 24 October. While this review, carried out by Professor Chris Whitty and Professor Stephen Powis, was always going to be a diagnostic-type review rather than enacted policy changes, it is now clear that rapid overhaul of medical training is urgently required, especially given the competition ratios experienced by UK doctors when applying for specialty training posts.

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The conclusions and recommendations now need to be followed up by clear and concise action, otherwise the NHS risks losing a generation of talented doctors who feel undervalued and unable to develop the skills needed for safe, effective consultant practice.

Aberdeen to Belfast to Doha to London

I have just returned from Belfast, where I spent a few days meeting with the Northern Ireland Council of the College, along with Chief Medical Officer, Professor Michael McBride, and Chief Scientific Advisor, Professor Ian Young. We discussed the new Reset Plan, the Pathology Blueprint and the Carter Review. An excellent symposium followed, with the opportunity to meet with trainees afterwards.

I am next heading to the Middle East to deliver 3 talks at the 1st Qatar Conference on Laboratory Medicine and Pathology in Doha. I also plan to visit a pathology lab there and meet with many RCPath fellows from the area. I then return to London for National Pathology Week, International Pathology Day, College Council and our AGM – another busy month for the College.

Our key event this year is *Pathology Solutions* – a parliamentary reception to demonstrate how pathology services underpin healthcare and are central to delivering the 3 shifts in the NHS 10-Year Plan.

International Pathology Day

10-Year Workforce Plan for the NHS

The College is preparing a response to the Government's <u>call for evidence</u> in line with the 3 shifts identified in the plan: from hospital to community, analogue to digital and from sickness to prevention.

The call for evidence is currently open and closes on 11:59pm on 7 November 2025. Individual members can also respond.

Given the lack of funding in the system, it has been made clear by senior ministers and advisors that simply growing the workforce and spending more money in the NHS cannot be the solution. Instead, we need to look at using the resources and staff that we have, embrace technology such as automation, digital and Al, and look to different ways of working in order improve productivity.

For pathology, bigger efforts in diagnostic stewardship to reduce demand on our services are also essential, especially given the predicted demographic changes and the impact on our services that that is likely to bring. For those services that are failing because of the lack of pathologists and scientists, we will still need to lobby hard to increase out training capacity and better retain the ones we already have.

Prostate cancer

Prostate cancer has recently <u>featured heavily</u> <u>across the media</u> in anticipation of the <u>National Screening Committee</u> decision on whether to introduce a national screening programme.

College members who specialise in urological pathology attended a parliamentary reception for the launch of the National Prostate Cancer Audit 2025 State of the Nation Report, and a reception for a Prostate Cancer Research report launch on targeted prostate cancer screening.

Prostate cancer was also one of the areas we covered in our <u>submission to the Government's Men's Health Strategy for England</u>. See also <u>Dr Aiman Haider's article</u> in the October Bulletin.

<u>Dr Martin Goddard</u>, College Subspecialty Advisor on Cardiac Pathology, was interviewed by the <u>Pathologist magazine</u>, discussing the investment gaps in pathology services for men's health. We are calling for urgent investment in diagnostics, point-of-care testing, and laboratory integration to detect disease before irreversible damage occurs.

The interview followed <u>our submission to the</u> <u>Government's Men's Health Strategy for</u> England.

Advocacy and influence

Dr Clair Evans, Chair of the Specialty Advisory Committee on paediatric and perinatal pathology, and I are meeting Sarah Hall MP, Labour, Warrington South, and MPs from the areas most affected by the shortage of pathologists to carry out paediatric postmortems. Sarah Hall is working to raise key issues in parliament, and we will use the opportunity to highlight our report on the paediatric and perinatal pathology workforce, which will be launched later this autumn.

New College report finds critical consultant shortages across immunology services

Our latest workforce report highlights severe shortages across immunology, with 3-quarters of UK services saying they don't have enough staff to meet demand. Immunology is essential to diagnosing and treating complex conditions, from allergies and autoimmune diseases to cancers and immunodeficiencies. Yet, services are now stretched to breaking point. In Scotland, just 2 consultants are covering the entire country.

The UK needs at least 44% more consultant immunologists to meet current demand, but many services are surviving only through unpaid overtime and goodwill. The impact on patients is already clear, with delays to diagnosis and treatment, and consultants at high risk of burnout.

Without urgent action, which means more training posts, investment in modernised services and stronger retention measures, access to safe and specialist care will only deteriorate. Read the full report on <u>our website</u>.

Recommendation on the use of tumour staging systems from the College's Working Group on Cancer Services

The College's Working Group on Cancer Services has reviewed its recommendations for the use of staging systems following the recent publication of TNM Classification of Tumours, 9th edition.

The College recommends transition to TNM 9 from 1 January 2026 for patients diagnosed on or after this date. The subspecialties that differ from this can be found in full on the website: Recommendation on the use of tumour staging systems from the College's Working Group on Cancer Services (October 2025).

The College is in the process of updating new appendices for each dataset to update the staging and reporting proformas to adhere to updates from TNM 9.

Medical examiner training

The College is the <u>lead medical royal college for medical examiners</u> and provides training for any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner. Participants will need to complete mandatory 26 e-learning modules and attend an entire face-to-face training day to receive a certificate of completion. The day includes short presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience. Medical examiner training is open only to medically qualified individuals who work in England and Wales. New medical examiners who successfully complete the training and the e-learning modules will be invited to join the College as members.

Medical examiner officer training

The College also leads on the training of medical examiner officers (MEOs).

MEOs work closely with medical examiners and undertake tasks such as coordinating the completion of death certificates and referrals to the coroner and speaking to clinicians and bereaved families.

MEOs may come from a wide range of backgrounds. For example, nurses, healthcare scientists or bereavement officers although this list is not exhaustive. More information, including a <u>model job description</u>, is on the <u>College website</u>.

The face-to-face training day is the second part of MEO training. Everyone attending the course must have completed the 26 mandatory core e-learning modules before the date of the course to get the most out of the training day. The e-learning modules <u>can be accessed here</u>. (Registration with e-Learning for Healthcare is required.)
