### RCPath 60th Anniversary Land's End to John o' Groats Cycle Challenge

I was delighted to join College Vice-President, Professor Sarah Coupland, College Vice-President to present a cheque for over £35,000 to Cancer Research UK. The donation was the culmination of a cycle ride challenge from Land's End to John O'Groats completed by Sarah, College members and other participants including researchers, nurses and cancer patients.

### Histopathology Reporting: Advanced Practice and Scientist Reporting

The joint meeting between the College and the Institute of Biomedical Science (IBMS) to discuss extended roles for Biomedical Scientists in Histopathology Reporting was well attended with over 130 College members and Biomedical Scientists joining online.

Thanks to the panel and to the attendees for their questions. We will be adding these, along with the answers, to <u>our FAQs webpage</u>. We also have a number of action points from the meeting to follow up on and there are plans to host another meeting in a years' time to see how things have progressed.

### **Engaging parliamentarians and stakeholders Laboratory visits**

- I hosted a visit by Tim Ferris, NHS England National Director Transformation at North-West London Pathology. He toured our laboratories and discussed how we can improve NHS pathology services nationally for better patient care.
- I wrote to the reappointed Health Secretary, Rt Hon Steve Barclay MP, to highlight the vital role pathology plays in healthcare. We have also contacted the new health ministers now they are in post. Steve Brine MP has been elected as the new Chair of the Health and Social Care Committee and I have written to him expressing our aim to stay as involved with the committee as possible.
- Prof Louise Jones, Chair of the Genomics and Reproductive SAC, pitched to the Science and Technology Committee at the House of Commons, following our written submission on genomics earlier this year. There were 90 entries and only 6 invited to pitch. The pitch focused on delivering genomics medicine on the UK.
- While our pitch was not chosen as the successful presentation, the presentation raised awareness of genomics and the committee may decide to recommend further action. You can watch the presentation on the live streamed session on the <u>parliament</u> website – Prof Louise Jones's presentation is

at 10:14 am on the recording. Find out more on the College website.

- As one of over 200 member organisations in the <u>Health Inequalities Alliance</u>, we wrote a <u>joint letter</u> to the former Health and Social Care Secretary, Therese Coffey, urging her to maintain the commitment to publish the Health Disparities white paper.
- I was delighted to speak at the Westminster Health Forum conference on Next steps for cancer prevention, diagnosis, treatment and care in England. The conference was chaired by Elliot Colburn MP who has been very supportive to the College and introduced our first Diamond Jubilee <u>Bulletin</u>.

#### Access to patient records through the NHS App

The NHS App is changing so it will be easier for patients to read news entries to their GP record, which may include laboratory tests results. Consideration will need to be given to how reports are written to ensure clinical colleagues receive clear accurate information, bearing in mind that these may be read by patients. There is <u>quidance</u> for health staff and we recommend <u>Lab Tests Online UK</u> as a reputable source of laboratory test information for patients.

### Professor Sir Alimuddin (Ali) Zumla FRCPath awarded Sir Patrick Manson Medal by the Royal Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene

The <u>Sir Patrick Manson Medal has been awarded to RCPath Fellow Prof Sir Alimuddin (Ali) Zumla by The Royal Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene (RSTMH)</u>. Professor Sir Alimuddin Zumia was awarded the medal for his world-leading contribution to global health.

#### **Blood Management**

Following an amber alert issued by NHS Blood and Transplant on 12 October, blood stock levels have improved, returning to Pre-Amber.

Trusts are no longer required to postpone any elective surgery, but NHSBT has requested that patients are transfused appropriately using patient blood management guidance.

We will remain in Pre-Amber status until 2023. This remains subject to stocks remaining strong and is dependent on continued good practice and application of clinical guidance, along with success in recruitment to the donor collection teams.

#### Medical examiner training

The College is the <u>lead medical royal college for medical examiners</u> and provides training for any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner. Participants will need to complete 26 mandatory e-learning modules and attend an entire face-to-face training day to receive a certificate of completion. The day includes short presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience. Medical examiner training is open only to medically qualified individuals who work in England and Wales.

#### Medical examiner officer training

The College also leads on the training of medical examiner officers (MEOs).

MEOs work closely with medical examiners and undertake tasks such as coordinating the completion of death certificates and referrals to the coroner, and speaking to clinicians and bereaved families.

MEOs may come from a wide range of backgrounds. For example, nurses, healthcare scientists or bereavement officers although this list is not exhaustive. More information, including a model job description, is on the College website.

The face-to-face training day is the second part of MEO training. Everyone attending the course must have completed the 26 mandatory core e-learning modules before the date

of the course to get the most out of the training day. The e-learning modules <u>can be</u> <u>accessed here</u>. (Registration with e-Learning for Healthcare is required.)

#### BSACI guideline for the set-up of penicillin allergy de-labelling services by nonallergists working in a hospital setting

The British Society for Allergy and Clinical Immunology (BSACI) published a guideline for the set-up of penicillin allergy de-labelling services by non-allergists working in a hospital setting.

Penicillin allergy labels are associated with antimicrobial resistance, are less effective in healthcare and increase healthcare costs. Most penicillin allergy labels prove to be incorrect when tested, therefore removal of an incorrect label is a key strategy for improving antimicrobial stewardship and reducing patient harm from alternative antibiotics.

<u>The new guideline</u> provides a framework for the set-up and delivery of penicillin allergy delabelling services by non-allergists with an interest in clarifying the penicillin allergy status in adults and children with an untested label of penicillin allergy.
