Time of change

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Pathology Transformation

There continues to be much discussion around the topic of pathology modernisation. I have had recent meetings with corporate partners, the association for Laboratory Medicine, BIVDA and the NHSE Pathology team. We have now planned to host a meeting focusing on histopathology modernisation in the

College on the 14 September. It is clear that there is both a realisation and an appetite for further integration of services. This can however only occur if we see much needed upfront investment in workforce, IT, digital, automation and laboratory estate improvements.

Workforce

This remains one of the biggest challenges for Pathology services and for healthcare in general. The College has been very active in developing its own workforce strategy, including data collection and spotlight reports. We have been engaging strongly with the long term workforce plan team, NHSE workforce and training and the Medical Education and Training Review. I have also been able to discuss directly the issues facing pathology with the new National Medical Director of NHSE/DHSC, Prof Frankie Swords. Many additional training places have been promised, and it is vital that pathology gets its much needed share to help fill the gaps in consultant numbers that are already emerging.

Wales, N.Ireland and the Republic of Ireland.

In the next two months I will be attending meetings, symposia, councils and conferences across the three nations. I will also be discussing pathology issues with senior government and NHS colleagues from the devolved administrations. I am especially looking forward to attending the Association of Clinical Biochemists in Ireland Conference for the first time.

National Cancer Plan

RCPATH Past President, Professor Mike Osborn, will be joining a parliamentary roundtable discussion, hosted by Clive Jones MP (sponsor of the Cancer (Reporting and Strategy) Bill). The event will focus on how we can collectively realise the National Cancer Plan's ambitions on earlier diagnosis.

The National Cancer Plan was published earlier this year and [our response](#) welcomed the expansion of diagnostic capacity.

The aim for 98% of histopathology tests to be reported within 10 days by March 2029 is very ambitious given the current state of consultant staffing in pathology departments.

Despite developments such as automation, digital pathology and artificial intelligence-based tools, the level of vacancies and planned retirements within the profession is likely to have the biggest influence on turnaround times.

August marks four years since the launch of The Pathology Portal, a fantastic free educational resource for the global pathology community.

Political party conferences

As many of you will know, autumn marks the political party conference season while the House of Commons is still in recess.

Professor Sarah Coupland, President Elect, will be attending an event organised by the Royal College of Physicians at the [Liberal Democrat Party Conference](#) to discuss the NHS workforce crisis, exploring key workforce issues, such as recruitment, retention and burnout.

[Forensic pathology workforce report](#)

The College's latest workforce report highlights the challenges facing forensic pathology services across the UK. There has been no growth in consultant forensic

pathologist numbers in nearly a decade, despite reported increased complexity of caseloads. The report raises concerns as to whether the current workforce and training pipeline is sufficient to meet demand. RCPATH continues to highlight what needs to happen in terms of investment in workforce and innovation in order to meet the future demand that is predicted.

The Times recently reported significant advances in the treatment of **malignant melanoma** using a combination of immunotherapy and personalised vaccines. My reply, published the following day, highlighted the importance of ensuring we have enough pathologists in place to enable this diagnostic and treatment pathway to become viable.

Liver Pathology Bitesize Webinars series

The College is the [lead medical royal college for medical examiners](#) and provides training for any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner. The website, which has now been going for over 20 years, would not exist without the support, including technical and financial support from the Association for Laboratory Medicine (LabMed), and financial support from Institute of Biomedical Science (IBMS) and the Royal College of Pathologists (RCPATH) and, very importantly, all the volunteers on the LTO Board including lay members, editorial team and content reviewers. IFCC C-MDO Survey on Molecular Diagnostics Based on Circulating Biomarkers in Oncology

The IFCC Committee on Molecular Diagnostics (C-MDO) is conducting this survey to assess the current implementation of molecular diagnostics based on circulating biomarkers (e.g., cell-free nucleic acids, circulating tumor cells, and extracellular vesicles) in diagnostic laboratories worldwide.

The results of the survey will help identify current practices, unmet needs, and opportunities for harmonization and standardization, and will support future IFCC C-MDO recommendations and educational activities. One response per laboratory is preferred. The survey should take approximately 10 minutes to complete.

The Committee on Carcinogenicity (COC) is recruiting for a new Chair – Department of Health and Social Care

COC is an expert advisory committee that provides independent scientific advice to government departments and agencies on matters concerning carcinogenicity risks to humans and advises on whether substances are likely to cause cancer. All applicants for the role of Chair must be a recognised scientific or medical expert with a track record of national or international achievement relevant to risk assessment for carcinogenicity and chemicals in the environment or food.
