President's Messages of the Month

We have had a really good response to the consultation on proposed governance changes to the College, including voting rights for Diplomates and a lay chair for Trustees, and especially to the option that future Presidents (following Dr Osborn!) don't come from the same specialty as the preceding one. So, subject to approval at the Annual General Meeting in November, you will have the significant changes to the College that so many of you have requested. I am pleased to have seen so much engagement with this consultation, and very glad to see a formal decision on these changes during my tenure.

We have seen considerable progress in many other areas that we have been working on – a new £50 million investment in LIMS and interoperability infrastructure in England is a significant development that we are pleased to see. We have also seen more investment in clinical biochemistry and molecular equipment in the UK, and announcements of additional development funding for digital pathology. I am really delighted to see another year of full recruitment to histopathology specialty training, with infection, haematology and other disciplines maintaining their excellent uptake.

We have had great interest in the upcoming elections, and you will have the opportunity to elect some superb colleagues to represent you in our future work. Keep an eye out for the election papers!

Once again, I, and so many others, deeply appreciate all you are doing regarding the pandemic. Your work across all our specialties is crucial, especially as we try to return to normal working. The recent resurgence in cases, and some of the sad consequences of infections within hospitals, are all too stark a reminder of the human tragedies that we are working to avoid. You are superb. Thank you.

Working to make opportunity and inclusivity a reality at the College

As a first step to address this, we have been listening to colleagues about their experiences, and have asked many organisations with expertise in this area how we can support a more diverse leadership culture. We are recruiting an Advisory Group to make further recommendations to the College Trustee Board on how we can encourage and enable more people of all identities and from all backgrounds to become involved in the College.

We are looking for members, trainees and lay representatives to bring their expertise and own experiences to the group to explore issues and advise the Trustees.

The Art and Science of Practical Management – new webinar series

Together with the chair of the Trainee Advisory Committee Dr Matthew Clarke, I am launching a new webinar series – Core skills for leadership and management – to help support training in these domains while face-to-face opportunities are limited.

This programme of case-based and reflective learning about the management of complex or difficult situations will draw on real-life experience. I will cover the theory and practical aspects of leadership and management in a healthcare setting.

This series is for everyone – from trainees and students to new and established consultants, clinical scientists, biomedical scientists and all staff who want to reflect on their skills and learn tips and tactics to deal with difficult situations.

There will be a chance to ask questions at each session so do join us on Wednesday evenings from 7:00 to 7:30pm starting on 7 October until 25 November.

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Round up

- Following a letter I sent to the Health Secretary, Matt Hancock, I spoke in the media about the risk from home antibody tests for COVID-19 and also took part in a series of local radio interviews. We are aware that COVID-19 antibody testing devices, intended for professional use only, have been offered for direct sale to consumers without the required reassurance of appropriate laboratory or professional back up. The use of these for unsupervised self-use test falls outside current regulations, and can mislead the public and put individuals at risk.
- I was delighted to contribute to an evidence session organised by the All Party Parliamentary Group on coronavirus about COVID-19 Test and Trace. You can find out more and watch the session on our <u>On the Agenda page</u>.
- We were pleased to submit evidence to the Justice Committee inquiry on the Coroner Service. The Justice Select Committee has expressed concern that not enough progress has been made to improve the Coroner Service, since reforms were introduced in 2009, and has launched an inquiry. We will publish our findings on this as soon as possible.
- For the past few months, we have held weekly <u>COVID-19</u> seminars on the disease, its <u>pathology</u> and its clinical implications. For those of you who missed them, or would like a recap, you can <u>view all 17 videos on our</u> website.
- Somewhere in the UK someone is diagnosed with blood cancer every 14 minutes. This September we are supporting <u>Blood Cancer Awareness</u> <u>Month</u> to highlight the huge breadth of expertise in the pathology workforce that supports blood cancer diagnosis.

The Beautiful Brain

This special course focuses on the instrumental role of neuropathological study in the analysis of human brain disorders, examining prenatal onset, management, cause identification, genetic advice, and research on human neurodevelopment and new therapies. This course is recommended to health professionals involved in prenatal/fetal medicine, perinatal and paediatric pathologists, neuropathologists, neuroradiologists, neurologists, gynaecologist-obstetricians, geneticists and neuroscientists.

Update on placenta: physiology and new concepts

Thursday 17 and Friday 18 June 2021

To be held at the Royal College of Pathologists, 6 Alie Street, London E1 8QT CPD credits: 9

Placental pathology is a unique area of perinatal pathology. Its understanding requires knowledge of normal development, physiology and histopathology as well as fetal and maternal medicine. Requests for placental examination have grown exponentially in recent years, but this has not been matched by histopathologists trained in reporting them. This course will provide an update on placental physiology, current classification and new insights into the knowledge of placental conditions.

The course is designed for paediatric/perinatal and general histopathology trainees at any stage of their training, as well as consultants. The course will also be of benefit to obstetricians, both consultants and in training.

Medical examiner training

The College is the lead medical royal college for medical examiners, providing the essential training that will equip you with the knowledge and skills you will need for this important role. Any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner will need to complete mandatory e-learning modules and attend a face-to-face training day. The day will include short presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience.

A certificate will be awarded to provide evidence of completion of the face-to-face component of the medical examiner training. This training complements the elearning that you must complete before attending this training. The College is inviting new medical examiners to join as members. This is dependent on completion of this training and evidence of satisfactory completion of the e-learning modules. Please note, it will be necessary to stay for the entire day to receive a certificate of completion of this training. You must have completed all 26 core e-learning modules before attending the face-to-face training.

Medical examiner officer training

The College is also leading on the training of medical examiner officers (MEOs). The training days are open to anyone who has been appointed or is considering applying to work as a MEO.

MEOs work closely with medical examiners and will undertake tasks such as coordinating the completion of death certificates and referrals to the coroner and speaking to clinicians and bereaved families. There is more information about the role of an MEO including a model job description on the College website.

MEOs may come from a wide range of backgrounds. It is anticipated that many will be nurses, healthcare scientists or bereavement officers by background, although this list is not exhaustive.

The face-to-face training day is the second part of basic MEO training. Everyone attending the course must have completed the 26 mandatory core e-learning modules before the date of the course. It is vital that you have completed this preparatory work to enable you to get the most out of the training day. The e-learning modules <u>can be accessed here</u>. (Registration with e-Learning for Healthcare is required.)
