We have sent letters to the <u>Integrated Care Systems</u> (ICSs) in England to introduce the <u>College's Regional Representatives</u> and to explore opportunities to promote pathology engagement and input into ICS meetings.

We have received a number of positive responses outlining opportunities for engagement and collaboration. This is an important first step, working directly with ICSs is a great opportunity for pathology services.

Promoting research – Trainees' Research Medal Awards 2021

A key component of the <u>College mission</u> is to promote study, research and innovation in pathology and disseminate the results. One way we do this is by recognising and rewarding the best of the excellent science that College trainees publish, encouraging them in their research careers.

Our Trainees' Research Medals are awarded annually for outstanding research work undertaken by pathologists or scientists in training

<u>Applications are invited from trainees</u> who are first author or first joint author on single original research papers published between 1 July 2020 and 30 June 2021.

Please encourage any trainees who you think could be eligible to submit their research by Friday 3 September.

Patient Safety Awareness Week 2021

This year's <u>week will run from 17 - 23 September</u>. Organised to raise awareness of patient safety to help improve pathology services, the week will feature the release of an infographic, podcasts, videos, Patient Safety Bulletins and an essay competition.

On the agenda

• We were pleased to see that the College's recommendations on the role of medical examiners in investigating baby deaths were noted in the <u>report</u> from the House of Commons Health and Social Care Committee Expert Panel on

maternity services in England. <u>Our submission</u> to the inquiry was also published.

- We welcomed the <u>Elective Care Framework Restart, Recovery and</u> <u>Design</u> published by the Department of Health in Northern Ireland and Robin Swann MLA, Minister of Health. The Elective Care Framework proposes a £700m investment over five years and sets out a five-year plan to reduce the backlog of patients currently waiting for assessment and treatment. It promises investment in pathology and digital pathology rollout, which should help, but there are still concerns about the surge in demand for pathology services.
- It was welcome to see a case study from Leeds Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust featured in the NHSX cancer digital playbook, <u>Futureproofing neuropathology</u> <u>diagnosis with digital pathology imaging</u>.
- The College <u>fully supported the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges' (AoMRC)</u> <u>statement</u> that caution will still be required after the lifting of restrictions. Medical royal colleges, as the professional voice of doctors, believe that continuing to be cautious is the right thing to do for both individuals and organisations.
- Dr Bernie Croal, Chair of the Scotland Regional Council, received a welcome letter from the Scottish Government recognising the vital contribution laboratory professionals have made in these unprecedented circumstances. This was in response to a letter sent to the new Cabinet Secretary for Health and Social Care, Humza Yousaf.

The survey found 83% of pathologists reporting on cytology samples are general cellular pathologists. RCPath Foundation Fellowships – applications close end of August

The College will be making a number of Foundation Fellowships available again this year. The Foundation Fellowship scheme is open to Foundation doctors who secure a post rotating through any pathology specialty – this includes histopathology, haematology, medical microbiology and infectious diseases or any other specialty represented by the College. Most consultant job descriptions that the College's Workforce Department currently endorse, and posts that come to interview, are for joint Medical Microbiology (MM) and Infectious Diseases (ID).

The department is seeking to recruit new assessors who are dual accredited in both MM and ID.

The College attaches great importance to the duties of its assessors on interview panels (a.k.a. advisory appointment committees/AACs). College assessors act as our spokesperson regarding the adequacy of the candidates' suitability for the post.

They also play a vital role in helping us uphold the highest standards of pathological practice. The College assessor is often the only statutory external influence on an AAC.

Medical examiner training

The College is the <u>lead medical royal college for medical examiners</u> and provides training for any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner. Participants will need to complete mandatory 26 e-learning modules and attend an entire face-to-face training day to receive a certificate of completion. The day includes short presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience.

New medical examiners who successfully complete the training and the e-learning modules will be invited to join the College as members.

Medical examiner officer training

The College also leads on the training of medical examiner officers (MEOs).

MEOs work closely with medical examiners and undertake tasks such as coordinating the completion of death certificates and referrals to the coroner, and speaking to clinicians and bereaved families.

MEOs may come from a wide range of backgrounds. For example, nurses, healthcare scientists or bereavement officers although this list is not exhaustive. More information, including a model job description, is on the College website.

The face-to-face training day is the second part of MEO training. Everyone attending the course must have completed the 26 mandatory core e-learning modules before the date of the course to get the most out of the training day. The e-learning modules <u>can be</u> <u>accessed here</u>. (Registration with e-Learning for Healthcare is required.)

Research into feelings of shame as result of experiencing the GMC disciplinary process

Researchers at the University of Birmingham and University of Exeter are interested in experiences of doctors who have felt shame or other negative or self conscious emotions as a result of experiencing the GMC disciplinary process. The researchers are looking to see how these feelings, emotions, and experiences influence the delivery, experience, and maintenance of medical care.

The research is funded by the Wellcome Trust (217879/Z/19/Z) and has ethical approval from the Health Research Authority.

If you are a doctor based in England, the researches would like to hear about the incident(s), your feelings and how you processed this. Your participation in the research will involve an interview with a member of the project team that will last about an hour. Survey on the use of automatic identification and data capture technologies in the NHS

NHSX is exploring the impact of using automatic identification and data capture (AIDC) technologies such as RFID (radio-frequency identification) and RTLS (real-time location system) in health and care. These technologies can be used to track assets and inventory and manage consumables across different areas to improve operational efficiency and reduce costs. NHSX is asking for your views by filling this <u>survey</u>. Your responses will provide insight into your challenges and barriers and the support needed from NHSX to overcome them. <u>The survey is open until Monday 30 August 2021</u>.

NHSX launch three new digital playbooks

NHSX's three new digital playbooks are designed to help clinical teams reimagine and redesign how patients receive care and integrate digital solutions into a patient's treatment journey.

The new playbooks focus on mental health, gastroenterology and cancer and are a series of free-to-access webpages on the <u>NHSX website</u>.

The suite of playbooks, which covers eight of the largest outpatient specialties by volume, forms part of NHS England and NHS Improvement's work to redesign outpatient pathways. They support the NHS's commitment to reduce face-to-face outpatient appointments by up to a third over the next five years and make digitally-enabled primary and outpatient care mainstream across the NHS.
