Cost of Training

The junior doctors' contract dispute highlighted several areas where the College could communicate better with trainees. We have since carried out two surveys and worked closely with the Trainees' Advisory Committee to understand trainees' needs. The College is committed to being completely transparent with all members about its income and how this is spent. In relation to trainees we are particularly keen to provide as much information as possible about the cost of training, including exams. This information is now on the College website.

Important tax announcement

College staff have worked extremely hard to have College exams recognised by HMRC as allowable against tax. We have had to provide curricula and sample contracts for each specialty. I am delighted to announce that HMRC have just confirmed that College exams for medical members are now allowable. Members can submit claims for the last four years. Request for examples of innovation and best practice across the chemical pathology and histopathology workforces

Cytopathology Study Day NEW

Friday 18 September 2017

CPD: 5 Credits

To be held in in the General Classroom, Hodgkin Building, KCL, Guy's Hospital, Great Maze Pond, London SE1 9RT

This one-day meeting will discuss a selection of specimen types with challenging morphology and the role of emerging terminologies and ancillary tests. Reporting terminologies for salivary gland and thyroid are among the highlights of the meeting. Microscopy sessions will include these as well as a range of other cytology samples including breast, pancreas, EBUS, urine and serous fluid cytology. This study day is aimed at trainees and consultants in cytopathology, particularly those newly qualified or interested in updating their knowledge.

Gynaecological Pathology reporting: What really matters - When and Why Monday 16 October 2017

To be held at: The Royal College of Psychiatrists, 21 Prescot Street, London E1 8BB 6 CPD Credits

It is important for histopathologists to understand the clinical significance of their reports and how a data item that is critical in one clinical scenario may be entirely irrelevant in another setting. This novel study day aimed at senior trainees and consultant histopathologists will explain how gynaecological pathology data is used to guide patient management as well as discussing the significance of each data item in different clinical scenarios and specimen types. The course will enable attendees to adopt a more efficient personalised approach to histopathology reporting by focussing on accurately reporting data items that are clinically relevant in a particular case.

Gastrointestinal Pathology: Diagnosis and recent advances 'NEW'

Wednesday 22 November 2017

To be held at: Coin Street Conference Centre, 108 Stamford Street, London

SE1 9NH CPD Credits: 5

This is a one-day course, comprising an update and review of gastrointestinal (GI) pathology. It should be suitable for specialist GI pathologists, consultants with a GI pathology interest, and relatively senior trainees. The speakers include two internationally recognised and highly distinguished experts, Dr Robert Odze from the United States and Dr Karel Geboes from Belgium. Also on the programme are several very experienced UK-based GI pathologists. Emphasis is on the histological diagnosis and classification of non-neoplastic and neoplastic disease, and on clinicopathological correlation.

First Bi- Annual UK Endocrine Pathology Society/Royal College of Pathologists Endocrine Pathology Update 'NEW'

This meeting will be aimed at consultants with a special interest (or aiming to specialise) in endocrine pathology & will also be suitable for Trainees approaching RCPath Part 2. The faculty includes nationally and internationally recognised experts in endocrine pathology and oncology.

NEWS FROM EXTERNAL ORGANISATIONS Cellular Molecular Pathology Imitative (CM-Path) – Survey

CM-Path Initiative (Workstream 2 Clinical Trials) would like your participation in a survey regarding your knowledge of the National Cancer Research Institute Clinical Studies Groups (NCRI CSGs).

The aim of this survey is to collect information on pathologists' awareness and attitudes towards NCRI CSGs in order to encourage greater pathology contribution to clinical trials.

The <u>survey</u> should only take 5-10 minutes, all the information provided will be anonymised and will be used to generate reports for NCRI and the CM-Path Initiative.

Anti-microbial resistance survey

Antibiotic resistance is a growing health threat and one that raises challenges for healthcare systems across the world. Diagnostics can play an important role in the management of antibiotic resistance, but more information is required on the type of diagnostics that are most needed in different places and situations.

You are invited to take part in a short online survey (15 minutes) on *Preferences towards types of diagnostics to meet the challenge of anti-microbial resistance*. The primary purpose of the survey is to provide an understanding of different stakeholders' preferences towards the types of diagnostics needed to meet the increasing global challenge of resistance to antibiotics.

The survey is funded via the UK government's *Tackling AMR initiative* and has been designed and conducted by independent researchers at the <u>Science Policy Research Unit</u> (SPRU) at the University of Sussex and the <u>Office of Health Economics</u>.

If you do choose to participate, your contribution will be anonymised. The findings of the survey will be reported publicly and used to inform policy debate.
