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President's Message

New Prime Minster, Secretary of State and Health and Social Care Select Committee Chair

In one of his first tasks as Prime Minister Rishi Sunak has reshuffled his cabinet, reappointing Steve Barclay as Secretary of State for Health and Social Care. I have written to the new Health Secretary requesting a meeting to ensure that pathology is high on the Secretary's agenda as he takes up his new role. I will also be writing to the new health ministers once they are in post.

We are also anticipating the election of a new Chair of the Health and Select Committee in early November. We had a good working relationship with outgoing Chair, Jeremy Hunt and we will work to ensure this continues with the new Chair.

Your College, Your Profession Member Engagement Tour

In late September and early October we held the first 'Your college, your profession' events in Plymouth & London. These were attended by members from different specialties and stages in their careers.

The groups discussed issues around workforce and resourcing, providing examples of problems faced and examples of solutions implemented locally, and suggestions of actions for the College to pursue or raise with policymakers. The NHS England Regional Lead for Pathology Services attended the Plymouth event which was particularly helpful in relation to these discussions. Subsequent discussions focused on what

the College does well and what it can do better. The conversations were frank and helpful. We certainly learnt a great deal from these first engagement events and I was very pleased to be able to have the opportunity to meet members and have such a productive and constructive discussion.

Further events have been arranged across the UK, with meetings in Glasgow, Aberdeen, Belfast, Bodelwyddan, Newcastle, Norwich and London before Christmas. The College and the Institute of Biomedical Science (IBMS) will be jointly hosting a hybrid meeting on Friday 11 November between 10.30am and 12.30pm.

The meeting aims to discuss extended roles for Biomedical Scientists undertaking advanced Histopathology Reporting on defined histopathology specimens with consultant oversight.

The purpose of the meeting is to discuss the programme, look at other areas of medical practice where extended roles have been successful and for senior representatives of the College, IBMS and Health Education England (HEE) to listen to any concerns or other feedback.

Engaging parliamentarians and stakeholdersWe were pleased to join the Academy of Medical
Royal Colleges at their '<u>Fixing the NHS</u>' roundtable
events at both the Conservative and Labour party
conferences.

Professor Sarah Coupland, Vice President for Communications, attended the event at the Labour conference where she was joined by Feryal Clark MP.

Feryal Clark MP delivered the closing remarks following the varied discussion on pressures facing the NHS and social care and the short and long-term solutions that can make a difference for patients.

I attended the roundtable at the Conservative party conference to advocate for pathology services and raise pressing workforce issues. Lord Bethell, Former Parliamentary Secretary of State for Health and Social Care, delivered the opening remarks to stimulate discussion and there were some useful insights spanning workforce, integration, tech and patient access and experience.

I also met Matt Warman MP who has a particular interest in innovation and technology. We will continue to work with these politicians to highlight the importance of diagnostics in healthcare.

We joined 200 member organisations in the Health Inequalities Alliance, to write a joint letter to the Health and Social Care Secretary of State. The letter urged her to maintain the commitment to publish the Health Disparities white paper and to commit to a cross-government strategy to reduce health inequalities.

Medical examiner training

The College is the <u>lead medical royal college for medical examiners</u> and provides training for any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner. Participants will need to complete 26 mandatory e-learning modules and attend an entire face-to-face training day to receive a certificate of completion. The day includes short presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience. Medical examiner training is open only to medically qualified individuals who work in England and Wales.

New medical examiners who successfully complete the training and the e-learning modules will be invited to join the College as members.

Medical examiner officer training

The College also leads on the training of medical examiner officers (MEOs).

MEOs work closely with medical examiners and undertake tasks such as coordinating the completion of death certificates and referrals to the coroner, and speaking to clinicians and bereaved families.

MEOs may come from a wide range of backgrounds. For example, nurses, healthcare scientists or bereavement officers although this list is not exhaustive. More information, including a model job description, is on the College website.

The face-to-face training day is the second part of MEO training. Everyone attending the course must have completed the 26 mandatory core e-learning modules before the date of the course to get the most out of the training day. BSACI guideline for the set-up of penicillin allergy de-labelling services by nonallergists working in a hospital setting

The British Society for Allergy and Clinical Immunology (BSACI) published a guideline for the set-up of penicillin allergy de-labelling services by non-allergists working in a hospital setting.

Penicillin allergy labels are associated with antimicrobial resistance, are less effective in healthcare and increase healthcare costs. Most penicillin allergy labels prove to be incorrect when tested, therefore removal of an incorrect label is a key strategy for improving antimicrobial stewardship and reducing patient harm from alternative antibiotics.

<u>The new guideline</u> provides a framework for the set-up and delivery of penicillin allergy delabelling services by non-allergists with an interest in clarifying the penicillin allergy status in adults and children with an untested label of penicillin allergy.
