

Death Investigation Committee

Terms of Reference

1 Purpose

The Death Investigation Committee will advise Council and oversee the delivery of the responsibilities of the College with respect to all matters and issues relating to the investigation of non-forensic deaths by pathologists in the United Kingdom, including

2 Accountability for:

Standards and Best Practice

- Giving advice to Specialty Advisory Committees and College Specialty Training Committees (CSTCs) regarding service implications of changes to training in and policies relating to non-forensic autopsy work.
- Delivering information and recommendations to the Workforce Department on matters relating to workforce planning for autopsy pathology.
- Advising on the production of learning resources for pathologists in training or in independent practice, e.g., e-learning resources.
- Coordinating the production of guidelines relating to non-forensic autopsy scenarios, for example deaths due to drowning, hanging, imaging-based autopsies, etc.
- Considering all proposals, guidelines, official documents and other developments of which the College becomes aware that are likely to have an impact on the work of autopsy pathologists.

Specialty Engagement

- Working with the Communications Department and other members of College staff to develop a section of the website with information and services that are relevant to autopsy pathologists.
- Providing advice and/or guidelines to non-forensic autopsy pathologists regarding when to refer a post mortem to a forensic pathologist.
- Providing advice to non-forensic autopsy pathologists regarding interactions with medical examiners, coroners and procurators fiscal.
- Representing the field of non-forensic autopsy pathology to external stakeholders and advising on relevant national policy on matters as necessary.
- Undertaking any other work of relevance to autopsy pathologists as Council sees fit.

3 Membership

The membership of the Committee will be College appointed members¹ or designated representatives of approved bodies and shall be approved by Council, and membership shall comprise the following:

- Chair (must be an active Autopsy Pathologist who carries out regular non-forensic autopsies)
- Autopsy pathologists (up to ten)
- A forensic pathologist
- A toxicologist (involved in death investigation)



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- The lead examiner for the Certificate of Higher Autopsy Training (CHAT)
- The autopsy guidelines series co-editor
- A Trainees' Advisory Committee representative from histopathology and forensic pathology
- A post mortem CT advisor (radiologist or radiographer)
- The Chair or a nominee from the following SACs:
 - a) Cellular Pathology
 - b) Forensic Pathology
 - c) Medical Examiners Committee
 - d) Neuropathology
 - e) Prenatal, Perinatal and Paediatric Pathology
- Honorary officer representation (ex officio) Officers are all ex-officio members of committees and should be included in any item that requires a vote
- RCPath Director of Communications
- Devolved nation representatives:
 - a) Scottish representative
 - b) Northern Ireland representative
 - c) Wales representative
- Representatives from external organisations/bodies:
 - a) A representative nominated by the Chief Coroner's Office.
 - b) A representative nominated by the Crown Office Procurator Fiscal Service
 - c) A representative nominated by the Coroners Service for Northern Ireland
 - d) A coroner proposed by the Coroners' Society of England and Wales
 - e) A representative nominated by the Human Tissue Authority
 - f) A representative nominated by the Association of Anatomical Pathology Technology
