Coronavirus outbreak

As the coronavirus outbreak accelerates, I want to continue to offer our huge thanks to all our members coping with this pandemic. I am incredibly proud of all the pathology teams, the retired pathologists who have answered the call to help, and our trainees who have been so fantastic.

We've pulled together a <u>hub of guidance and advice</u> that has been incredibly popular and the feedback has been excellent. This includes links to the latest coronavirus information and resources from the College, and we know that this is being used by members all over the world. Thanks to everyone for their contributions to this, and especially to the Specialty Advisory Committees who have done such great work producing guidance and reviews at such speed for our members. We are constantly updating this COVID-19 hub so please do keep checking back to this and our social media channels for the latest updates. There is so much content being added weekly, that I have not listed it here, but do visit.

It has been breakneck speed in all we have been doing across the College and, in particular, we have been working with the microbiology, virology, infection, blood sciences and immunology communities to look at viral and antibody testing. We have made strong representations at all levels of government, and I am now meeting once or twice weekly with the UK Secretary of State for Health and Social Care as part of the testing task force. I have weekly calls all with the Chief Medical Officer of England, and with the Emergency response team. The daily calls regarding testing also continue, and we have been pivotal in the Testing Methods Crowdicity platform looking at diagnostic innovations to helps solve specific challenges and to then share these with the community of pathologists. I am also creating and sharing my own video updates about the crisis, which you can find here.

I am particularly looking forward to joining hundreds of you at this evening's COVID-19 virtual learning event, the first of a virtual series of short updates from experts....do register and join in with the <u>future seminars</u>!...again accessible via the resource hub.

I am particularly aware of the pressures you are all under at this time. Your work has been outstanding, our sense of community has never been stronger and the support from each to the other has been truly heartwarming. I also know that many of you have been unwell, and that many of you will have lost loved ones. Our pathology community has also lost several extremely valued colleagues during this period. My heart goes out to you all, and all of us wish you all the very best during this extremely difficult time.

In other news

 We welcomed the proposals set out in the March 2020 Budget that recognised the problems that current pension tax issues have caused for the NHS. The government's proposals address the position for the majority of doctors and other senior staff which I welcome. It will be important to have detailed and transparent guidance that will make clear who will now be excluded from the taper tax and, for the very small proportion of individuals still affected, what this means and what measures they can take to mitigate the financial burden, if required.

Advice regarding Advisory Appointment Committees (AACs)

If you are seeking to appoint to a consultant post at this time, please note the following:

- Foundation Trusts can go ahead without a College rep as these Trusts are legally permitted to do so. Please contact <u>workforce@rpath.org</u> to let us know that you have had the interview and the outcome of it for our records.
- NHS Trusts are still legally required to have a College rep, so will be asked to
 postpone the interviews, or find someone in their geographical area but with no
 close links to the Trust. Please let us know at <u>workforce@rcpath.org</u> who acts as
 the College rep and the outcome of the interview for our records.

If you are a potential College representative on an AAC, please note the following: For the duration of the pandemic, we encourage the use of virtual meetings to conduct interviews. However, the AAC will wish to reassure itself that a candidate interviewed in this way is not given an unfair advantage or disadvantage over a candidate interviewed face to face. It is important that the AAC satisfies itself as to the candidate's identity.

Update on placenta: physiology and new concepts

Thursday 2 and Friday 3 July 2020

Placental pathology is a unique area of perinatal pathology. Its understanding requires knowledge of normal development, physiology and histopathology as well as fetal and maternal medicine. Request of placental examination has grown exponentially in recent years, but this has not been matched with histopathologists trained in reporting them.

This course will provide an update on placental physiology, current classification and new insights into the knowledge of placental conditions. The course is designed for paediatric/perinatal and general histopathology trainees at any stage of their training as well as consultants. The course will also be of benefit to obstetricians, both consultants and in training.

Undergraduate Pathology Summer School

Medical Examiner Update Tuesday 16 June 2020

To be held at the Royal College of Pathologists, 6 Alie Street, London E1 8QT CPD credits: 6

This is the first annual Medical Examiner update meeting, bringing together national and regional leaders to discuss current issues. Topics include the impact on the coronial system, the challenges of implementation, the view from the Healthcare Safety Investigation Branch and Care Quality Commission, the regional structure, role of the Medical Examiner Officer and gross negligence manslaughter.

Medical examiners: training

The College is the lead medical royal college for medical examiners, providing the essential training that will equip you with the knowledge and skills you will need for this important role. Any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner will need to complete mandatory e-learning modules and attend a face-to-face training day. The day will include short presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience.

A certificate will be awarded to provide evidence of completion of the face-to-face component of the medical examiner training. This training complements the e-leaning which you must complete before attending this training. The College is inviting new medical examiners to join as members. This is dependent on completion of this training and evidence of satisfactory completion of the e-learning modules. Please note, it will be necessary to stay for the entire day to receive a certificate of completion of this training. You must have completed all 26 core e-learning modules before attending the face-to-face training.

Medical examiner officer training

The College is also leading on the training of medical examiner officers. The training days are open to anyone who has been appointed, or is considering applying to work as an MEO.

MEOs work closely with medical examiners and will undertake tasks such as coordinating the completion of death certificates and referrals to the coroner, and speaking to clinicians and bereaved families. There is more information about the role of the MEO, including a <u>model job description.</u>

MEOs may come from a wide range of backgrounds. It is anticipated that many will be nurses, healthcare scientists or bereavement officers by background, although this list is not exhaustive.

The face to face training day is the second part of basic MEO training. Everyone attending the course must have completed the 26 mandatory core e-learning modules before the date of the course. It is vital that you have completed this preparatory work to enable you to get the most out of the training day. The e-learning <u>can be accessed</u> <u>here</u>. (Registration with e-Learning for Healthcare is required).

Funding Opportunities from the Healthcare Infection Society

- **Career development bursary** up to £2.500 for healthcare professionals to use for the cost of a learning experience (e.g. courses or workshops) to further the skills and knowledge of HCAI/IPC (UK and Ireland only). The applicant must be a HIS member for at least two years. Deadline: 1 June. Visit: <u>HIS website</u>.
- Small research grant up to £10,000 can be used for small-scale research projects lasting up to 12 months. The research must be healthcare associated infections(HCAI) focused. Deadline:1 September. Visit: <u>HIS website</u>.
- Public engagement grant up to £1,000 may be used to support a diverse type of events and activities, which will help raise awareness on the topic of HCAI. Deadline: 1 September. Visit: <u>HIS website</u>.

- Mike Emmerson International Fellowship up to £2.500 for a healthcare professionals from a low or middle-low income country to come to the UK and undertake observership in the UK or Ireland. No deadline. The applicant must identify a host institution and a sponsor who is a HIS member. Visit: <u>HIS website</u>.
- **Major research grant** up to £99,000 for a large research project (up to three years) with a clear HCAI/IPC question. Deadline: 1 September. Visit: <u>HIS website</u>.
