President's Messages of the Month

Welcome to the November e-newsletter. This month I particularly wanted to highlight two collaborative initiatives involving the College.

Choosing Wisely

Many of you will have seen media coverage of <u>Choosing Wisely</u>, which is part of a global initiative aimed at improving conversations between patients and their doctors. The aim is to avoid tests, treatments or procedures that are unlikely to be of benefit.

The <u>first list</u> of forty treatments and procedures of little or no benefit was launched last month, having been drawn up by the Academy's member royal colleges and faculties. The list, which includes <u>examples from the College</u>, details advice to both patients and doctors.

Improving the health of people with serious mental illness (SMI)

Nearly half (46%) of people with SMI have a long-term physical health condition and are at risk of losing on average 10-20 years of their lifespan due to physical ill-health.

The need for the partnership report, <u>Improving</u> the physical health of adults with severe mental <u>illness: essential actions</u>, was first identified by former College President, Dr Archie Prentice, who was also instrumental in helping to bring it to fruition.

The report makes practical recommendations for changes that will help adults with SMI to receive the same standards of physical healthcare as the general population.

National Pathology Week: 7-13 November

With National Pathology Week nearly upon us, I wanted to highlight the fantastic range of events that will be taking place across the UK over the next week. From The Art of Pathology in Liverpool to A Hitchhiker's Guide To Leukaemia in Cambridge, college members will be running events aimed at people of all ages to improve public awareness and understanding of pathology and the important contribution pathologists make to healthcare.

Neuroimmunology update for Neurologists and Immunologists

Friday 11 November 2016

To be held at The Royal Pharmaceutical Society, 66-68 East Smithfield, London E1 1AW

The day aims to provide an update on the pathogenesis and treatment of several immune-mediated neurological disorders including autoimmune encephalitis, paraneoplastic syndromes and MS. Full programme to follow shortly.

<u>An update on infections during pregnancy - A Joint RCOG/RCPath meeting</u> Monday 14 November 2016

To be held at The Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists 27 Sussex Place, Regent's Park, London, NW1 4RG

A number of pathogens can infect pregnant women and harm the fetus or lead to the loss of the pregnancy. Current knowledge and awareness of the screening, prevention and treatment of some of these infections among healthcare professionals is variable. In addition, practice and recommendations are constantly changing, eg pertussis vaccine in pregnancy. This one-day course is aimed at trainees, obstetricians, midwives, GPs, sonographers and neonatologists. It will provide a comprehensive update on the management of infections during pregnancy, including screening, diagnosis, prevention, complications and treatment.

Advances in Transfusion Medicine

Thursday 24 & Friday 25 November 2016 10 CPD credits both days

The Royal Society of Medicine, 1 Wimpole Street, London, W1G 0AE

This two-day meeting organised on behalf of the College brings together experts from various clinical disciplines with leaders in transfusion science to provide a broad overview of current key developments informing evidence based practice. Also included as part of the programme is the College Foundation Lecture emphasising the increasing importance of blood group genomics and application to clinical practice.

Clinical Trials for Pathologists

Friday 9 December 2016

To be held at Coin Street Conference Centre, 108 Stamford Street, London, SE1 9NH

This is a one-day course for pathologists who are interested in contributing to, or developing, leadership skills in clinical trials and translational research. The course will consist of a mixture of lectures, small group discussions and interactive 'break-out' sessions with faculty members.

Liver Biopsy in the Assessment of Medical Liver Disease

Friday 17 March 2017

5 CPD credits

To be held at The Royal College of Psychiatrists, 21 Prescot Street, London E1 8BB

This course will provide a practical diagnostic approach to reporting medical liver biopsies, focusing on the importance of clinico-pathological correlation in assessing common patterns of liver damage. Recommended for senior trainees in pathology and hepatology and consultant histopathologists and gastroenterologists who are regularly involved in liver biopsy assessment (without necessarily working in a Liver Unit).
