# National Institute of Clinical Excellence (NICE) guidelines - Lynch Syndrome

<u>NICE</u> has issued new\_guidance recommending that microsatellite instability (MSI) testing or immunohistochemistry should be offered to everyone diagnosed with colorectal cancer to help identify people with Lynch syndrome.

College guidelines have long stated these tests should be routinely carried out on all people diagnosed with bowel cancer under the age of 50 at the time of diagnosis.

While new guidance from NICE is a positive step towards identifying patients with Lynch Syndrome, its implementation can only be delivered by increasing resources in cellular and molecular pathology laboratories and genetic services.

# RCPath/ Institute of Biomedical Science (IBMS) Conjoint Board for Histological Dissection – Call for new members and examiners

The Conjoint Board for Dissection (RCPath and IBMS), is looking for enthusiastic consultant histopathologists to join the board or to assist in exam setting and portfolio/examination marking.

The role of the board is to govern the process of the Diploma of Expert Practice (DEP) in Histodissection and Advanced Specialist Diplomas (ASD) in Specimen Dissection (Breast and Lower Gastrointestinal pathology) and to revise and develop new and existing dissection qualifications and plan/run the assessment process. The board meet approximately three times a year at the IBMS offices in London.

## Multi-Source-Feedback (MSF) for Trainees - update

Updated MSF information is now available on the <u>College website</u>. The ST1 histopathology MSF will start on 6 March and the ST1 chemical pathology/ST3 chemical pathology (metabolic medicine) MSF will start on 13 March. For trainees in ST3 and ST5 (or ST5 and ST7 for chemical pathology/metabolic medicine), please note that you can commence the MSF process yourself via the <u>LEPT system</u> at a suitable time to coincide with your forthcoming ARCP.

Medical Microbiology and virology trainees on the original 2010 curricula who are not required to transfer curricula should continue to use LEPT and initiate their ST5 MSF as required. All other medical microbiology and virology trainees should use the RCP ePortfolio

# The CM-Path Clinical Trials Pathology Advisory Group (CT-PAG) is recruiting for scientific members

CT-PAG is an advisory group that sits within the new National Cancer Research Institute (NCRI) initiative in cellular molecular pathology, CM-Path. The Advisory Group will provide advice on pathology requirements in clinical trial design to researchers, funders and others. Specifically, members of the advisory group will provide guidance and critique on pathology and biomarker components of trials.

The remit of the group is broad, including advising on:

- Tissue acquisition, processing, storage and access.
- Tissue analytics, including DNA and RNA sequencing, genomic microarrays, DNA methylation, PCR, proteomics, metabolomics, circulating tumour cells and cell-free DNA, immunohistochemistry, in situ hybridisation.
- All types of biomarkers including predisposition, screening, diagnostic, prognostic, predictive, pharmacological and surrogate response.
- Biomarker discovery, assay development, qualification.
- Bioinformatics of large data sets, biostatistical analysis.
