## ITEM NO. 5 – DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Professor Ismail Matalka provided a summary of his activities undertaken since the IC meeting on Wednesday 9<sup>TH</sup> November 2021. These activities included the following:

- 1. Recruited and appointed (subject to a Council and Committee approval) a new International Regional Advisor for Sub-Saharan Africa the International Team
- 2. Coordinating activities that have enabled MoUs with The National Postgraduate Medical College of Nigeria (NPMCN) and the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Pakistan and Pakistani Association of Pathology to be renewed for a term of 3 years: The International Team.
- 3. Histopathology FRCPath Part 2 exams were run in Egypt and Dubai this October taken by approximately 70 candidates in total Professor Ismail Matalka, Professor Mona Professor Mona El-Bahrawy, Country Advisor for Egypt and Dr Shroque Zaher, Country Advisor for the UAE.
- 4. Planning for International Pathology Day 2021, taking place on Wednesday 10th of November. Themed on digital pathology incorporating aspects of AI A World's EyeView Kelley Price.
- Continuing work on ARISE the sickle cell project. Planning to resume staff exchanges between, countries in Sub-Saharan Africa, the UK and Europe in the first quarter of 2022 are underway - Kelley Price and Dr Wale Atoyebi.
- 6. Designing and delivering a five-week training programme for seventeen haematologists in Saudi Arabia a subsidiary project to ARISE. Involving the Institut National de la Sante et de la Recherche Medical (INSERM), France, Saudi Arabia's Ministry of Health and Accsight, a Saudi Arabian based training consultancy. The IBMS and NEQAS, UK also delivered a number of lectures across the programme Dr Wale Atoyebi and Kelley Price.
- 7. Planning for the College President to attend Medlab 2022 to take part in a panel discussion as well as securing speakers in RCPath's role as supporting body for the inperson Medlab Middle East January 2022



programme - Professor Ismail Matalka, Professor Angharad Davies, Joanne Brinklow, Tanna Hawkins, Kelley Price and members of the communications team at the College.

- 8. Supporting the running of a well-attended virtual event titled Modern Approaches to Diagnostics in the COVID-19 Era in collaboration with National Healthcare of Ukraine, one of our MoU partners Olga Wise and Mark Howard, Country Advisors for the Ukraine and Kelley Price.
- Hosting a virtual examiners training session for examiners at the National Postgraduate College of Nigeria (NPMCN). The session focused on diversity and inclusion. Material from the examiner's session run by the College in June 2021 was featured and a live Q&A was included - Joanne Brinklow, Professor Obafunwa, Country Advisor for Nigeria and Kelley Price.
- 10. The development and launch of the Refugee Scheme at the College, including the current resources available to support refugee pathologists in the UK with their GMC registration via the PLAB route Tanna Hawkins.
- 11. Met with a Trustee from the BMA charities and the Lincolnshire project regarding refugees, and initiated discussions on collaborating in a webinar event in 2022 to discuss the Royal College of Pathologists and the current scheme available to refugee pathologists in the UK Tanna Hawkins
- 12. Assisted with the Sudanese Doctors union to make OET available in Sudan Dr Hebah Ali (International Education Lead Sponsorship and ITSS Histopathology)
- 13. Established a working group for ITSS Medical Microbiology Dr Anan Ghazy (International Education Lead MTI and ITSS Medical Microbiology)
- 14. Successfully co-ordinated with the Country Advisor in South Africa to host the next IPS event, due to take place on the 12th and 13th November 2021. This event will be in collaboration with the University of Pretoria, South Africa and South Africa's National Health Laboratory Service (NHLS) – Professor Tahir Pillay, Tanna Hawkins
- 15. At the previous Committee meeting, it was reported that MTI applications had declined, and it was unlikely that we were going to be in a position to report the same figures for the scheme as we did in the 2019/2020 period. The International Department were delighted to report a small increase in the numbers for 2020/2021 – Tanna Hawkins
- 16. Received and processed 12 applications under the Sponsorship Scheme under the new financial period of 2021/2022 for either GMC registration or Pending Status Dr Hebah Ali, Tanna Hawkins
- 17. Received and processed 15 applications under the MTI scheme under the new financial period of 2021/2022 for GMC registration Dr Anan Ghazy, Tanna Hawkins

#### (a) <u>Americas</u>

### Summary of activities undertaken taken during this period

Tele-meeting of Fellows in the region of Americas – 5<sup>th</sup> August 2021

#### (b) The Middle East & North Africa (MENA)

#### Summary of activities undertaken taken during this period

- Update on the new 2021 classification of tumours of the CNS (2 sessions were held). This aims at updating participants from the MENA region on the most important aspects of the new classification and its impact on the daily diagnosis and practice of pathologists in the region. This was supplemented by case presentations and discussion of the implementation of the new classification.
- A one day symposium on "Breast carcinoma" on the 30<sup>th</sup> October 2021. The activity aims at increasing the awareness on breast carcinoma in the month of Breast Carcinoma Awareness. This was delivered through a multidisciplinary approach with speakers including pathologists, surgeons, radiologists, psychologists, nutritionists and cancer survivors to emphasize on the role of multidisciplinary team approach. The orgnizers included Dr. Omar Qassid, Associate MENA region Advisor (UK), Dr. Ahmad Omar (UK), Dr. Fatima Hashim (Bahrain), Dr. Eman Abdelzaher (Egypt) and myself (Jordan). There were more than 300 participants from all over the MENA region countries. The Activity was accredited 6 CPD hours from the RCPath.

## Although numbers are still worrisome, almost all countries are easing out of lockdown

- Businesses opening
- Domestic travel/tourism opened
- International borders still closed
- Most conferences and MDTs in hybrid mode
- Pathology laboratories continue to be heavily engaged in COVID-19 testing

#### Pathology training and practice in Malaysia

- Master of Pathology (University-based) is main pathology training programme
- The new normal has set-in
  - · Practical training has continued well with adherence to SOPs for safety
  - Classes/seminars/multidisciplinary team meetings almost entirely using teleconferencing
  - Training through webinars, online teaching and teleconferencing established, more international input
  - Face-to-face sessions cautiously being restored
- Training centres take turns to host examinations
- MPath Examinations in October- November 2021 now on-going in hybrid mode

#### Emerging issues, opportunities and trends

- New normal of Online and Hybrid communication has settled in
  - Online and hybrid meetings have removed the distance of UK from the Western Pacific.
  - Easier for RCPath to be more engaged in meetings of overseas Fellows and local Colleges of Pathologists
- Growth of Local Colleges of Pathologists
- ISI journal (Malaysian Journal of Pathology)
- CPath-AMM now has 5 chapters:
  - Chemical Pathology & Metabolic Medicine
  - Anatomical Pathology
  - Perinatal and Paediatric Pathology
  - Medical Genetic Pathology
  - Transfusion Medicine

#### **Recommendations and Priorities for RCPath in the Western Pacific**

- Keep vigilance on Capacity-Building in Myanmar
  - Engagements with Myanmar in flux due to political situation
  - Continue to invite Myanmar pathologists and trainees to online sessions
- Strengthen parallel training in WP towards FRCPath
  - Establish regular online forum for potential trainees introducing RCPath and pathway towards FRCPath



- Establish WP FRCPath exam centres (online and practical)
- More involvement of International Members in RCPath initiatives
  - Consideration of time zone differences

Dr Terlizzo provided a summary was provided of progress over the past year:

#### Summary of activities undertaken taken during this period

- Webinar event with Shupyk National Healthcare University Ukraine 'Modern Approaches to Diagnostics in the COVID-19 Era 1st of October 2021
- Ongoing co-operation with Ukraine University thank to Dr O Wise and M Howard

#### Emerging issues, opportunities and trends

- The EU-UK Trade and Cooperation Agreement (TCA) and recognition of medical professional qualifications post-transition
- EU RPQ including the Trade and Cooperation Agreement and the Withdrawal Agreement (previously application of the EU MRPQ Directive)
- RPQ elements of free trade agreement negotiations
- Work to support regulators and professional bodies agree recognition arrangements, such as MRAs
- The GMC continues to work with its European medical regulator counterparts following the end of the Brexit transition period.
- The RCP is looking into the EUSS and any emerging issues from the upcoming deadline. It is also looking at immigration policy – specifically the Health and Care Worker visa and advocating to extended it to any social care workers. Regarding the PQB, the RCP will be pushing for more transparency and accountability on workforce planning with a designated body to publish workforce projections regularly and then for the Secretary of State for Health to respond with the government's future actions.
- Given that the UK has unilaterally decided to continue to recognise EU/EEA qualifications for up to two years post-transition, as a more immediate solution, the BMA initiated a MRPQ campaign to ensure continuity and legal certainty for both, medical professionals and students, in post-Brexit Europe.

#### ITEM NO. 8 - Covid-19

- Professor Angharad Davies wanted to address the accelerating Covid-19 crisis across the globe which is having a major impact on colleagues abroad. The RCPath is very concerned about this and are looking use our influence to support equitable distribution of vaccine internationally
- The RCPath supported an AoMRC statement urging the government to distribute its suplus vaccine to parts of the world that need it
- Supported the WHO declaration on vaccine equity
- Concern about the recent situation in India (regarding the DELTA variant)
