# **President's Messages of the Month**

# World Patient Safety Day - Tuesday 17 September

We are delighted to support the first World Patient Safety Day on 17 September. Organised by the World Health Organization, the College will be marking the day by launching its Patient Safety Strategy and new undergraduate pathology curriculum.

Patient safety is about maximising things that go right and minimising the things that go wrong for patients. It is one of three components of quality in healthcare alongside clinical effectiveness and patient experience and is a key priority for the College. The College produces a range of resources to support members in ensuring patient safety. We recently released our eighth <a href="Patient Safety Bulletin: missing in action">Patient Safety Bulletin: missing in action</a>. Our <a href="Clinical guidelines and best practice recommendations">Clinical guidelines and best practice recommendations</a> support practitioners across all areas. We are also compiling <a href="a wide range of resources">a wide range of resources</a> to further knowledge and learning about patient safety.

#### **Blood Cancer Awareness Month**

<u>Blood Cancer Awareness Month</u> is an ideal opportunity to help raise awareness of the symptoms of blood cancer and the role of pathologists in the diagnosis and treatment of patients. To mark this, we will be <u>launching a video</u> telling the story of Florence, a patient diagnosed with myeloma and her diagnosis, care and treatment from the pathology team at St George's hospital in London. We have also supported <u>Myeloma UK</u> by posting myeloma nursing education modules on the <u>eCPD app</u>.

To find out more about the issues affecting haematology services, we launched the haematology <u>workforce survey</u> last December. We know you want us to help make a case on your behalf to policy makers and parliamentarians. Please pass this to your local head and encourage them to participate!

#### Meeting NHS England's Chief Executive, Simon Stevens

I had a very productive meeting with the <u>Chief Executive of the NHS England, Simon Stevens</u>. We covered workforce, IT, networks, opportunities for clinical biochemistry, safety in genomics and the IT system for genomics including the needs in transfusion and what help AI might offer in the future. We have been asked to help him suggest priorities for AI support tools for histopathology.

#### **Pensions**

Across the UK, senior healthcare staff, including many of our members, have been hit with high tax charges as a result of a pensions taper scheme. We have been working with Government and the <u>Academy of Medical Royal Colleges</u> to try and get a resolution.

### College building shortlisted for further prestigious awards

We are very proud that the College's building at 6 Alie Street has been shortlisted for a number of awards including for <u>Building Magazine Project of the Year</u>. The Building Awards are the industry's longest running and most prestigious recognition of excellence.

The building has also been shortlisted by the <u>Brick Development Association</u> under the Education category against some stiff competition. This is great recognition for the building design and the College.

We are going to be open to the public on Saturday 21 September as part of <u>Open House London</u>. This is the world's largest architecture festival, which gives free public access to buildings over one weekend in September each year.

#### Round-up

- It was great to meet Prof Ian Cree, Head of the World Health Organization's Classification of Tumours Group at the <u>International Agency for Research on</u> <u>Cancer</u>. There is excellent work in progress and it's exciting to explore what the College can do in collaboration.
- We supported the government consultation on the mandatory fortification of flour with folic acid. Thank you to members who provided their views for this response. In the UK between 700 and 900 pregnancies each year are affected by neural tube defects that can cause severe disabilities, mandatory folic acid fortification of bread flour could prevent approximately 150 of these cases.
- The arrival of a new Prime Minister has inevitably meant changes in the
   <u>Department of Health and Social Care</u>. While Matt Hancock provides continuity
   as Secretary of State for Health and Social Care, new ministers in the
   department include Jo Churchill MP, Chris Skidmore MP and Nadine Dorries
   MP. We have written directly to them to ensure our concerns on areas such as
   workforce and investment in IT remain on the agenda and are arranging to meet
   them to brief them on pathology.
- We have been pushing for investment in Laboratory Information Management
   Systems for some time and it was pleasing to see £12m investment for this in

- North and East Yorkshire. We will continue to ask for further investment to ensure that we have IT that is fit for purpose to effectively manage samples, and associated data, and make working life easier for our members.
- I was delighted to visit Hemel Hempstead hospital as part of my #LabTour visits and I was really pleased to present a <u>College Excellence Award for Education</u> to the mortuary team who do such sterling work in training.

Our second Golden Hour Conference once again brings together clinicians and others who are passionate about transforming outcomes for injured patients. Building on the success of last year's event, the team will bring together local and international experts who will help us define the path to novel diagnoses and interventions. It is increasingly recognised that the opportunity to intervene in potentially preventable trauma deaths occurs in the pre-hospital and early emergency room phase. Increasingly, services are working much more closely with Her Majesty's Coroner's and pathologists and this is transforming our understanding of why our patients die.

Supported by College, the conference is an opportunity to build on the lessons learned from previous years and to bring about further exciting discussions about the future of trauma care. As an additional section this year, there will be a focus on the golden hour within the context of major incidents and multiple patient events, learning lessons of best practice from around the world.

### **Medical Examiners- face-to-face training**

Medical examiners will ensure accurate death certification across a local area, provide much-needed support for bereaved families and improve patient safety. medical examiners will be doctors registered with the GMC holding a current licence to practise. Any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner will need to attend a face-to-face training day and complete mandatory e-learning modules.

The College is the lead medical royal college for medical examiners, providing the essential training which will equip you with the knowledge and skills you will need for this important role. The day will include short presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience. The training has been trialled with experienced medical examiners from pilot or early adopter sites.

A certificate will be awarded to provide evidence of completion of the face-to-face component of the medical examiner training. This training complements the e-leaning which you must complete before attending this training. The College is inviting new medical examiners to join as members. This is dependent on completion of this training and evidence of satisfactory completion of the e-learning modules. **Please note** – It will be necessary to stay for the entire day to receive a certificate of completion of this training. You must have completed all 26 core e-learning modules before attending the face-to-face training.
