Junior doctor contracts

As you'll be aware, junior doctors have voted overwhelmingly to take industrial action on three dates in December. I have been in close contact with the College's Trainees' Advisory Committee and issued a statement last week on the latest developments. I also contributed to a statement issued by the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges. It is regrettable that negotiations have not yet allowed a fair and safe contract to be agreed. Junior doctors have the right to take industrial action and I am sure that their senior colleagues will do what they can to cover emergency activity to minimise harm to patients.

New College Website

I hope by now you will have noticed that our new <u>College website</u> has gone live. Developed with input from members at every stage, it has been designed to be viewed on all devices including tablets and smartphones. Your log-in details are the same as for the previous website and you can personalise your *MyRCPath* area with content that's of particular interest to you. We have worked hard to improve the navigation and introduced a single login for easy access to LEPT and CPD.

National Pathology Week 2-8 November 2015

National Pathology Week (NPW) 2015 saw hundreds of events take place across the UK to celebrate the vital contribution pathology makes to healthcare, with a focus on molecular pathology. Congratulations and thanks to everyone who participated and helped make the week another huge success.

In the run up to NPW the College hosted an interactive exhibition in parliament run by members and College staff. Hundreds of people visited the exhibition, including school groups, members of the public, 44 MPs (including the Secretary of State for Health) and over a dozen peers. I would particularly like to thank Lord Hunt of King's Heath and Dr Sarah Wollaston MP, for sponsoring the exhibition and speaking at the opening.

Pathology and the NHS Five Year Forward View

On 2 November we launched a response to the <u>NHS Five Year</u> <u>Forward View</u> (5YFV), which proposes a broad and far-reaching strategy to address the major challenges facing England's health services.

Pathology and the NHS Five Year

Forward View sets out five key pathology-related priorities that we

believe are particularly important for patient care and safety and underpin many of the changes proposed.

International Pathology Day - 18 November

The second International Pathology Day took place on 18 November, with events taking place around the world to highlight the contribution of pathology to global healthcare. Events were held in countries including the UK, Australia, Canada, USA, Malaysia, Singapore, Hong Kong, Pakistan, India, Germany and Bosnia and Herzegovina. The College hosted a conference at the King's Fund in London, with a wide range of speakers and audience members.
