### President's Message

#### Political change and upheaval

A month is a long time in politics. Since the last newsletter, we have seen not just new devolved government elections but also further turmoil for the Westminster government, with calls for the Prime Minister to step down and a series of ministerial resignations, including the Secretary of State for health and Social Care, Wes Streeting.

So we now have new health portfolio occupants across governments including the Welsh Cabinet Minister for Health and Care: Mabon ap Gwynfor, the Scottish Cabinet Secretary for Health and Care, Angela Constance, and a new UK Secretary of State for Health and Social Care, James Murray, although the latter may not be in that post for long given the pressure on the labour party to elect a new leader.

Nevertheless, this College will engage with Mr Murray and his wider team to champion the many issues facing pathology. Similarly, we will be contacting new ministers in the new Plaid Cymru government in Wales, and in the SNP government in Scotland, in the coming weeks to reinforce our [priorities for Wales and](#)

[Scotland](#), drawn up by the College Regional Councils.

### **Political Impact on healthcare, pathology and training**

Elections usually have a significant impact on government business, with a change of focus, purdah and parliamentary business delays all acting to slow down decision making.

Uncertainty with national UK leadership and the merry-go-round of government ministers we are likely to see in the coming months, will just add to this.

**Workforce planning** continues to be largely absent – knowledge about future demand, existing posts and expected retirements, and number of trainees are not being considered.

Lobbying by the College has contributed to the decision to squeeze out a few more specialty medical training places for histopathology, but it could have been more if NHS Trusts in England had been able to take up the offers – financial and training capacity barriers cited as the reason. In summary, workforce remains a high priority for the College and for pathology services. We will continue to push our workforce strategy and advocate nationally to ensure the needs of pathology disciplines are addressed.

### **Parliamentary engagement – Lab tours**

We sent out the devolved nation priorities document to a number of parliamentarians and we were delighted to welcome Dr Scott Arthur MP, Labour, Edinburgh South West, for a tour of the labs at The Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh as result of this engagement. The visit was led by Dr Charu Chopra, Chair of the Scotland Regional Council, and Dr Ingolfur Johannessen, Regional Council member.

I was pleased to meet Paul Davies MP (Labour, Colne Valley) with Prof Adrian Bateman, Chair of the SAC on Cellular Pathology, to discuss areas highlighted in our [response to the National Cancer Plan for](#)

[England](#). These included backlogs and heavy workloads, delays in turnaround time and limited capacity to scale services. Mr Daves has offered to put some questions to parliament on our behalf, and we will be working on these to increase political engagement.

### **[NHS Bill](#)**

At the start of a new session of Parliament, the UK Government announced a new Health Bill, which will make several changes to the structure and operation of the NHS in England.

Some of the key measures featured in the Bill include: the abolition of NHS England and Healthwatch England, bringing those functions into DHSC; legislating for the building of a Single Patient Record across NHS IT systems and transferring additional commissioning functions to ICBs.

The College will keep an eye on the Bill's passage through Parliament, which will commence in June. We will assess the Bill's implications for pathology services, and engage with government, ministers and parliamentarians.

### **Industry Leaders' Forum**

I was delighted to welcome over 100 stakeholders from across diagnostics and pharmaceutical industries, government, trade associations and our membership to the College's Industry Leaders' Forum. This one-day event aimed to support delivery of our corporate engagement strategy. The event programme combined speaker-led talks, audience Q&A, and breakout group discussions and offered a unique opportunity for representatives from the corporate sector to share insights and exchange knowledge with RCPATH Fellows, other professional bodies and government.

We were also very pleased to receive opening speeches from Dr Zubir Ahmed MP, former Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State at the

Department of Health and Social Care, and Dr Rhydian Phillips, Director of Diagnostics & Transport, NHS England. [You can read more about the day here.](#)

### **[The royal colleges have a lot to offer a changing NHS but are an undervalued asset | The BMJ](#)**

In this BMJ article I co-authored with Kamila Hawthorne, immediate past chair, Royal College of General Practitioners and past member of the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges and Daniele Bryden, immediate past dean, Faculty of Intensive Care Medicine, we focussed on the collective wealth of experience and expertise of medical royal colleges and how they can help shape the NHS. Many of the professional issues and barriers facing healthcare could benefit from college expertise, especially workforce planning.

### **Examination Issues – Sept Technical issues affecting FRCPATH Part 1 examinations – 23-25 September 2025**

Last September the College's exam team had to manage unforeseen technical issues with the online examinations provider, RISR, and their online proctor, Talview, which affected a number of FRCPATH Part 1 examinations.

We notified the GMC of the actions and mitigation we put in place to manage this incident and I am pleased to be able to report that they are satisfied with the actions the College undertook with regard to maintaining the standard and the marking of the examinations concerned. They also recognised that these were challenging incidents that the College's exam team had to manage along with their usual business work. They also felt that the team handled the incidents transparently and worked hard to make sure the College supported affected candidates.

**Thank you for your contribution to the 2026 workforce census**

I would like to thank members who took the time to complete the 2026 workforce census. Your contribution will enable us to compile the most comprehensive and robust dataset to date.

By completing the census, you have provided vital evidence that strengthens our engagement with government and NHS leaders, informs policy development and consultation responses, and helps provide insights for our workforce reports.

Over the coming months, the College will undertake a detailed analysis of the data collected to identify key demographic trends across the pathology workforce. We plan to publish the findings of the census later this year.

## Working for members

### **College video – What are our key services at the College?**

### **[House of Lords Science and Technology Committee](#)**

In April, the College submitted written evidence to the House of Lords Science & Technology Select Committee, for their consultation on '[Innovation in the NHS: personalised medicine and AI](#)'. Working with College members specialising in digital pathology, our evidence welcomed the benefits AI and genomic medicine could bring in improving diagnostic capability across pathology specialties, including in freeing up clinician time for more complex cases. However, we emphasised the importance of clinician oversight as technologies are developed and introduced in the NHS, and that NHS data and digital infrastructure needed significant improvements to ensure technology can be implemented reliably and in a way that inspires patient confidence. We hope the Committee will utilise our evidence before they publish their report on this topic later this year.

### **Honorary Librarian and Archivist**

The College will be inviting applications for the honorary role of Librarian and Archivist, following the decision of our current postholder to step down after many years of dedicated service.

The Honorary Librarian and Archivist provides oversight of the College's library and heritage collections, helping to ensure their preservation, accessibility and continued relevance to members and trainees. The role includes advising on the development and care of the collection, responding to occasional enquiries, and supporting wider engagement with the history and practice of pathology. We anticipate that the commitment will amount to approximately one day per month.

### **New report - Infection Prevention and Management in the UK: The Infection-Specialist Workforce**

The College joined leading infection specialty organisations across the UK to launch the report [Infection Prevention and Management in the UK: The Infection-Specialist Workforce](#) calling for urgent action to support and strengthen and modernise the UK's infection specialist workforce.

The report recommends reforms aligned with the NHS's 3 strategic shifts: moving care from hospital to community, shifting focus from sickness to prevention, and accelerating the transition from analogue to digital systems. It outlines how infection expertise can be embedded across healthcare settings to improve patient outcomes, strengthen resilience, and increase cost-effectiveness throughout the UK health system.

### **Coroners statistics 2025: England and Wales**

The latest statistics from the Ministry of Justice demonstrate that medical examiners are successfully providing independent scrutiny of causes of death.

The statistics show that the medical examiner system is successfully providing independent scrutiny of causes of death and more appropriate referral to coroners. This has contributed to a significant reduction in the number of deaths being notified to coroners, fewer post-mortem examinations being carried out and a reduction in the number inquests where death was due to natural causes. ## Get involved at the College

### **Veterinary Pathology Trainee Registration**

Trainees in anatomic veterinary pathology, clinical veterinary pathology, and veterinary microbiology are eligible to register with the Royal College of Pathologists for an annual fee of £54. Registration provides access to the various veterinary pathology curricula, the MyRCPath portal with member resources and committee documentation, quarterly Bulletins, an annual Veterinary Pathology newsletter, access to the Pathology Portal, reduced rates for scientific meetings and CPD events, and additional benefits such as TOTUM PRO eligibility.

The registration process requires completion of a form with evidence of training appointment, followed by online payment within 14 days. The College operates a "1 fee only" policy whereby trainees pay either the registration fee or diplomate/fellowship fee depending on their status, with special provisions available for circumstances such as maternity leave. It should be noted that the Diplomate and Fellowship fees supersede the trainee registration fee. This registration is intended to offer valuable professional resources and networking opportunities throughout veterinary pathology training. Veterinary Pathology trainees can register [here](#). ### **Veterinary Pathology Spring webinar series**

The RCPath has a long and distinguished history in veterinary pathology. Membership and Fellowship examinations in veterinary pathology have been conducted since the 1970s. Today, Fellowship of the RCPath continues to carry significant professional recognition, with Fellows acknowledged as specialists by both the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons (RCVS) and the Veterinary Council of Ireland (VCI).

We are delighted to present the RCPath Veterinary Pathology Spring Webinar Series, a programme designed to engage and educate pathologists, residents, specialists, veterinary surgeons, and undergraduate students across all specialties. The series will feature sessions on anatomical pathology, clinical pathology, and microbiology, covering topics of current relevance and interest. These include large animal disease surveillance, with a focus on emerging viral threats such as Bluetongue virus, wildlife forensic pathology, lipases, immunohistochemistry and pathology findings associated with telemetry devices and therapeutic oligonucleotides. The series will conclude with a dedicated discussion of the RCPath Fellowship examinations in veterinary pathology/microbiology, offering guidance and insight for those considering this qualification.

### **Liver Pathology Bitesize Webinars series**

Following some excellent sessions on medical liver disease in 2025, and based on feedback received from delegates, the UK Liver Pathology Group in conjunction with the Royal College of Pathologists are pleased to announce the continuation of our virtual liver pathology bitesize series.
