President's message

Ukraine

Watching the appalling war unfold in Ukraine, we are thinking of all those whose lives have been shattered including those of our healthcare colleagues.

Pathology: at the heart of your health

We would ask members to consider making a donation to the <u>Disaster Emergency Committee</u> appeal which is providing emergency aid including support for hospitals and healthcare facilities. <u>The Academy of Medical</u> <u>Royal Colleges has also made a statement.</u>

Organisations across the NHS and the health and care sector will also be keen to help. In order to coordinate offers of assistance, the NHS England and Improvement Stakeholder and Engagement Team have asked for offers of help to be sent to England.incident14@nhs.net, to avoid creating disruption or duplication.

The College holds a memorandum of understanding with <u>Shupyk Medical School in Ukraine</u>, with whom we have worked closely over the last three years. We have been in close touch with our country advisors for Ukraine and are responding to requests for help as best we can.

The College's International Team also has compiled a factsheet of information for Ukrainian doctors and provides support to refugee doctors already in the UK.

colours of the Ukrainian flag in a show of support. You can find out more here.

Health and Care Bill

The House of Lords has supported an <u>amendment</u> to the Health and Care Bill which requires future NHS workforce planning. The amendment had been rejected by the government previously. Proposing the amendment, Baroness Cumberlege said: 'Workforce is the single greatest problem facing the NHS.'

We supported the amendment as part of a coalition of over 90 health and care organisations calling for stronger provisions on workforce planning.

Without it, the bill will fail to address the biggest challenge facing the NHS and social care – staffing shortages and pressures.

College fellow awarded CBE

I want to congratulate College Fellow Professor Cheng Hock Toh, Consultant Haematologist at Liverpool University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, who was <u>awarded honorary Commander of</u> <u>the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (CBE)</u> by Her Majesty The Queen in recognition of his services to haematology and medicine.

Professor Toh has a distinguished career as a clinician, researcher, health technology innovator, educator and professional leader. He has worked at the Royal Liverpool University Hospital since 1995 and in 2001 helped to establish the hospital's renowned Roald Dahl Haemostasis and Thrombosis Centre. Professor Toh was recently profiled in the January issue of the *Bulletin*.

Parliamentary engagement

 Dr Srinivas Annavarapu, Chair of the Prenatal, Perinatal and Paediatric Specialty Advisory Committee, attended a meeting of the <u>All Party</u> <u>Parliamentary Group on Baby Loss</u>, which was held jointly with the All-Party Parliamentary Groups (APPG) on Maternity. The <u>College</u> <u>recommendations</u> were well received by the panellists, especially the issues relating to the acute national shortage of the perinatal and paediatric pathology workforce.

- Some of our College Fellows also attended the APPGs on Blood Cancer and Stem Cell Transplantation and Cellular Therapies' launch of their joint report on the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on blood cancer. We submitted <u>evidence</u> to this crucial inquiry which investigated how the diagnosis and management of blood cancer have changed as a result of the pandemic, and what measures are needed for services to recover.
- Elliot Colburn MP, Conservative MP for Carshalton and Wallington, introduced our <u>'Pathologists in Profile'</u> section of the January Bulletin and described his work with the College.

Joint Coroner and Medical Examiner Virtual Training Selected dates available

The relationship between Medical Examiners (ME) services and their local Coroners is vitally important, as highlighted at the ME training day. This event is an opportunity to consolidate understanding of topics including when to notify the Coroner and what constitutes an unnatural death, and will be attended by both MEs and Coroners. One of the aims is to facilitate networking between local MEs and Coroners, and so each event is focused on a single coronial region. Please try to attend the event for your region where possible. However, we appreciate that this is not always possible and you can attend any of the events if you wish.

• <u>29 Mar 2022 – Wales</u>

The day will run from 9am to 3:45pm and has been developed along similar lines to the ME face-to-face training day, with a mixture of short talks and breakout groups with discussion of challenging scenarios. There will inevitably be some revision of basic concepts to ensure that both MEs and Coroners understand each other's roles, but we hope that the scenario discussions in particular will build on previous learning.

This event is open to Medical Examiners and Coroners only.

Medical examiner training

The College is the <u>lead medical royal college for medical examiners</u> and provides training for any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner. Participants will need to complete mandatory 26 e-learning modules and attend an entire face-to-face training day to receive a certificate of completion. The day includes short

presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience. Medical Examiner Training is open only to medically qualified individuals who work in England and Wales.

New medical examiners who successfully complete the training and the e-learning modules will be invited to join the College as members.

Medical examiner officer training -

The College also leads on the training of medical examiner officers (MEOs).

MEOs work closely with medical examiners and undertake tasks such as coordinating the completion of death certificates and referrals to the coroner, and speaking to clinicians and bereaved families.

MEOs may come from a wide range of backgrounds. For example, nurses, healthcare scientists or bereavement officers although this list is not exhaustive. More information, including a model job description, is on the College website.

The face-to-face training day is the second part of MEO training. Everyone attending the course must have completed the 26 mandatory core e-learning modules before the date of the course to get the most out of the training day. New Consultant Day – Face to Face

The New Consultants' Day is a new event, intended to help and support anyone who has recently been appointed to a consultant post, or who will very soon be taking one up. It is appropriate for all pathology specialties and much of the content will be suitable for both medical consultants and consultant clinical scientists (with the exception of the GMC and BMA presentations).

You will hear from experienced consultants on a range of topics such as how to prepare a business case to secure resources, how to set up new services and how best to deal with complaints, and learn more about appraisal, revalidation and pension arrangements, among other things. To register, you should ideally have been appointed to a consultant post within the last year or have passed FRCPath and/or made a successful CESR application and expect to be appointed to a consultant within the next year.

Solving the Enigma of the Liver Biopsy - Virtual Event

Following excellent feedback during our inaugural "Solving the Enigma of the Liver biopsy" course in 2021, for 2022 we have revised the programme, aiming to cover other aspects within the specialty of liver pathology based on delegates feedback. This virtual liver day is aimed at consultant and SAS who report liver biopsies as part of their everyday workload, and senior trainees who may wish to enhance their understanding of liver pathology.

This course should provide updates and advancements on areas of liver pathology which can sometimes be found more challenging, focussing predominantly on medical liver, but also briefly touching on neoplastic pathology with regards to the diagnosis of hepatocellular lesions. The invited speakers are all experts within their field. At the end of each session there will be an opportunity for delegates to ask questions to the speakers.

External only post-mortem examinations (view & grants) - online questionnaire

Jacob Forster, a University of Dundee intercalating medical student, is looking at the attitudes of forensic pathologists, coroners and Procurators Fiscal toward the so-called 'view and grant' (external-only) post-mortem examination. The research is supervised by Dr David Sadler, a senior lecturer in Forensic Medicine. The questionnaire is aimed at exploring how these attitudes influence the scope of a post-mortem examination, and whether they serve as barriers preventing different groups of people from engaging with a Scottish-style 'view and grant' system.

You are invited to take part in an anonymous 10 minute questionnaire consisting of four sections (demographics, attitude statements, case examples, and a final free-text section). The survey is available via the <u>following link</u>.
