



# From Corpuscles to Corpses

## - what pathologists really do

<b>Event title</b>	Corpuscles to Corpses - what pathologists really do.
<b>Venue</b>	Local schools.
<b>Target audience</b>	Variable-some year 10 groups, some year 11, 12 and 13.
<b>Objectives</b>	To highlight the role of pathology in health care, offer career guidance, and illustrate choices in medicine.
<b>Age range</b>	14 -18 years.
<b>How was the event advertised?</b>	Letters written to all science teachers and careers teachers in Belfast area offering to visit the school.
<b>Number attending</b>	Variable -from 10 to whole year group (200).
<b>Booking required?</b>	Yes - mutually convenient dates agreed with school.
<b>Length of event</b>	From 30 minutes to 2 hours - variable.
<b>Refreshments provided?</b>	Various schools provided lunch, boxes of chocolates, coffee etc.
<b>Equipment needed</b>	PowerPoint presentation on USB stick - schools all provided data projector.
<b>People needed</b>	Volunteer pathologists.
<b>Printed material used</b>	National Pathology Week questionnaire sent round beforehand to determine level of knowledge about the role of pathologists.
<b>Room set up</b>	Teaching classroom, school library or hall.
<b>Event programme</b>	There were several versions of the lecture, one short, one long, one more aimed at medicine in general as a career choice and one aimed at pathology as a career choice. After the lecture there was a Q&A session.
<b>Possible variations</b>	N/A
<b>What did the audience particularly like?</b>	Seeing images of diseases.
<b>What surprised the audience?</b>	What tonsils looked like and that pathologists had to be medically qualified.
<b>What else would the audience have liked?</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• More diseases.</li><li>• More forensic pathology.</li></ul>
<b>How much preparation was involved?</b>	Several hours preparing the talks, plus time taken to get to schools and back.
<b>Any other comments?</b>	Would be better with several interested volunteers to take partrather, rather than one person doing everything.
