New Clinical Director of Safety and Quality

I am delighted to announce the appointment of Dr Berenice Lopez, who will take up the new position of Clinical Director of Safety and Quality for three years from November 2018. In her new role, Berenice will develop the College's patient safety agenda. She will focus on improving safety and quality in pathology, including learning from mistakes and the role of human factors.

Round-up

 We hosted a fantastic conference on Disruptive Technology in Pathology in partnership with the Association of Clinical Pathologists.

The meeting highlighted innovations that are changing healthcare, from the elimination of hepatitis C to gene therapy in haemophilia and sickle cell disease. As well as the transformation of diagnostics by scanning mass

spectrometry. Also covered were amazing technological developments with healthcare implications, including AI, drones, robots and swarm robotics. Attendees were buzzing, inspired and have asked us to repeat this.

- We continued to highlight the key findings in our <u>histopathology workforce</u> <u>census</u> with politicians, raising <u>questions in parliament</u> about the NHS workforce and the adequacy of staffing levels in histopathology departments in the NHS. We have also been pressing hard to get pay equity for all trainees across the UK. The clinical biochemistry survey is currently being analysed and the haematology survey is being prepared.

Challenges in the Clinical Biochemistry Laboratory and Beyond

This meeting is aimed at those with an interest in Clinical Biochemistry. It aims to provide an update on a range of current analytical and clinical issues, and will challenge some conventional thinking. There will be an update on topical areas in paediatric endocrinology, as well as a session challenging some common (mis)conceptions. The final session of the day will look at the impact of laboratory medicine on patient outcomes.

Advanced Molecular Brain Tumour Classification with Epigenetic Profiling

This one-day workshop will provide a multifaceted view of epigenetic profiling in adult and paediatric brain tumour diagnostics. The day will be supplemented with an interactive practical session where participants will have the opportunity to discuss the diagnostic approach of challenging adult and paediatric CNS tumour cases. These cases will be available to registered participants for viewing in a digital format before and during the workshop.
