President's Messages of the Month

This month we have seen some significant progress in our work across a range of issues and, whilst there is still a lot to do, we are making headway in some important areas.

Medical Examiners

Last week saw the announcement of significant patient safety initiatives by government. These included the introduction of medical examiners and stronger support for health professionals to learn from their mistakes.

As the lead medical royal college for medical examiners we campaigned for their introduction and we are ready to provide the training and support they need. Our <u>statement gives more detail</u>.

Tier 2 Visas

We have been asking government to review the Tier 2 visas to help our workforce issues. We have met with Jeremy Hunt and senior government advisors as well as writing to the Home Secretary, Rt Hon Sajid Javid MP. We were delighted to see this progress with the recent Home Office announcement that doctors and nurses will be exempt from the Tier 2 visa cap.

NHS Funding

I signed a joint letter with a number of other medical royal colleges calling for a 4% year-on-year increase in funding for the NHS. The letter was published in *The Times*. I welcome the confirmation from government of extra funding for the NHS and wait to see the detail.

Cancer Research UK (CRUK) – Shoulder to Shoulder

The College joined CRUK in Westminster to launch their new campaign: <u>Shoulder to Shoulder</u> <u>against cancer</u> asking government to train and employ more staff to diagnose and treat cancers early.

Our members can also support the campaign. CRUK are encouraging MPs to sign a letter to Theresa May, asking government to prioritise workforce in any upcoming spending review. You can get involved by asking your MP to sign the letter which is available on the <u>CRUK</u> website.

We promoted the vital role pathology plays in cancer diagnostics and the treatment of blood cancers, and we were very pleased with the number of CRUK Campaign Ambassadors who spoke to Dr Darren Treanor, our digital pathology lead and Dr Mike Osborn, Chair of the Cellular Pathology Specialty Advisory Committee. The ambassadors are volunteers who campaign on cancer prevention, early diagnosis, science research and access to treatments.

On the agenda

At this time it has been particularly important to feed our views to those developing new NHS plans and we have had lots of opportunities to have the voice of pathology heard.

- The Secretary of State Jeremy Hunt invited me to accompany him to visit six NHS trusts in Doncaster, Sheffield and Chesterfield to talk about reflecting on incidents and reducing patient harm through shared learning. The one-to-one time has meant he is now well briefed about pathology, its expertise and our workforce, IT and simplified commissioning needs.
- We issued <u>a joint response</u> with the medical royal colleges representing paediatricians, surgeons and anaesthetists to <u>Justice O'Hara's report on</u> <u>Hyponatremia related deaths in</u> <u>Northern Ireland.</u> The response focuses on each of the 96 recommendations made in the report, and is designed to support these recommendations being put into practice to improve patient safety.
- I attended a dinner at 10 Downing Street organised by the Chief of Staff along with presidents of other medical royal colleges where the future of the NHS was discussed including workforce and we were asked what we wanted to see. Workforce, Medical Training Initiative, visas, training, working life, IT including Laboratory Information Management Systems (LIMS), reducing fragmentation, regulation, social care, public health and equity of access to diagnostics were all part of the discussion.
- I met Jonathan Ashworth MP, Shadow Secretary of State for Health, and members of the shadow health team, Sharon Hodgson MP and Julie Cooper MP, at an event organised by the Academy of Medical Royal

Colleges and fed in the same issues as to government.

 As a result of raising our concerns about services in relation to HPV screening procurement, we are meeting with NHS England, NHS Improvement and a range of other stakeholders for a stocktake next week.

Dr Neera Patel Travelling Bursary

The College administers the Dr Neera Patel Travelling Bursary, set up in memory of Dr Neera Patel, FRCPath, who trained in cellular pathology and worked as a consultant specialising in breast pathology.

The bursary is for a histopathology trainee enrolled in a recognised UK training scheme who hopes to develop an interest in breast or head and neck pathology, to enable their participation in a national or international meeting.

The recipient will need to demonstrate how they will benefit from attending the conference and feedback a brief outline of the conference and how it has helped their career pathway.

Are you Involved In drug discovery and development?

Drug discovery and development involves a range of clinical disciplines. Crucially however, it all starts in the laboratory. The International Department is currently exploring the important role and contribution of pathologists, scientists and laboratory medicine professionals in the drug development process and how the results from research undertaken in the laboratory are directly used to develop new ways to treat patients and combat disease.

GMC Registration: New verification checks introduced for international medical graduates

The GMC is introducing a new process to verify the medical qualifications of international medical graduates (IMGs). From 11 June 2019, applicants for provisional or full registration with a licence to practice will need to have their primary medical qualification independently verified before registration is granted. The checks will apply to doctors who have qualified at a medical school outside of the UK, EEA or Switzerland; and those who are nationals of a country outside the UK, EEA or Switzerland who graduated from a medical school outside the UK.

Verification will be carried out by the <u>Education Commission for Foreign</u> <u>Medical Graduates (ECFMG)</u> through their online system – known as the <u>Electronic Portfolio of International Credentials (EPIC)</u> service. ECFMG will verify that the qualification is genuine by checking this directly with the doctor's awarding institution. Further information can be found on the <u>GMC website</u>.

Occupational English Test (OET)

The Occupational English Test (OET) is now being accepted by the GMC as proof of an overseas doctor's English language competency. International medical graduates can now submit an OET certificate as part of their application for GMC registration as an alternative to the more commonly known IELTS certificate. The OET has been developed with a specific focus on the healthcare profession and includes scenarios that reflect real workplace tasks and situations. The test can be taken in more than 100 locations in 40 countries.

The College now also accepts the OET certificate as a proof of English language competency for doctors applying for the <u>MTI</u> and <u>Sponsorship</u> <u>Scheme</u>.
