Roll-out of Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) primary screening into the NHS Cervical Cancer Screening Programme in England

We raised our concerns with NHS England (NHSE) about the process for the transition from cytology screening to full roll-out of HPV primary screening in December 2019.

We hosted a very constructive meeting with PHE, NHSE and professional groups in June. Much of our advice has been taken on board with the <u>announcement from NHSE</u> that it has agreed to begin a revised one-stage procurement process to support the roll-out of HPV primary screening into the NHS Cervical Cancer Screening Programme.

Making the transition safe, and ensuring that future staffing is secure is paramount. Cervical screening is a key service for cancer prevention, and we will continue to work to ensure that the programme works well for women.

Equality!

We are very pleased with the recent announcement that boys will also be vaccinated against HPV. Thanks to all involved in the development of the vaccines, clinical trials, collecting and analysing data, providing the evidence to support policy, as well as those making it happen. This is a move that the College strongly supports and it is absolutely the right decision.


Early Day Motion on cancer medicines

We were pleased to support an <u>Early Day Motion on cancer medicines</u> in parliament. We are concerned that cancer patients in Northern Ireland have faced two years of inequitable access to cancer medicines compared to the rest of the UK as they are not able to access medicines recommended by NICE under the NICE/Cancer Drugs Fund process. We will continue to ensure this issue is raised in parliament.

Pathology Futures: The Role of Genomics in Disease Diagnosis, Treatment and Prevention – 14 November

The role of genomics in the diagnosis and treatment of disease is growing at a phenomenal pace, allowing patient care to become more personalised. As a result, pathologists are not just involved in an initial diagnosis; but in the entire treatment pathway of a patient. Where a disease has a genetic basis and molecular testing is performed, the role of the pathologist in guiding treatment through the course of a patient's therapy is crucial.

As part of the College's International Pathology Day (IPD) celebrations, the College has partnered with The Pathologist to host this one-day event, exploring the important role and contribution of pathologists, scientists, and laboratory medicine professionals in the treatment pathway and care of patients, and how the results from research undertaken in the laboratory are directly used to develop new ways to treat patients and combat disease. The day will be filled with talks, interactive exhibitions, workshop presentations, and the College's popular International Pathology Day Roundtable.

100 miles for the College! Prudential RideLondon | Sunday 29 July 2018 College fellow and Regional Council for Wales's member Dr Jim Seale completed this year's Prudential RideLondon challenge, which took place on Sunday 29 July 2018. Prudential Ride London is seen as the world's greatest festival of cycling. This year's event is the sixth of its kind. A total of 26,720 riders completed the event.

Dr Seale began his journey from 9am in Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park, then followed a 100-mile route on closed roads through the capital and into Surrey's stunning countryside. With leg-testing climbs and a route made famous by the world's best cyclists at the London 2012 Olympics, it's a truly rigorous experience. After heading through Leatherhead, Oxshott and Esher the route took Dr Seale back into London through Kingston and over Putney Bridge to the Embankment all the way alongside the Thames and across Parliament Square and up Whitehall. The route continued through to Trafalgar Square, under Admiralty Arch before a spectacular finish on The Mall.

You can still support Dr Jim Seale by visiting his <u>fundraising page</u> to raise much-needed funds to support the implementation and evaluation of a human papillomavirus (HPV) screening pilot project in Zimbabwe.

HPV is the cause of almost all cervical cancer cases and is responsible for an important fraction of other anogenital and head and neck cancers. Current estimates indicate that in Zimbabwe every year 2,270 women are diagnosed with cervical cancer and 1,451 (64%) die from the disease. This pilot project aims to reduce mortality rates through the introduction of a screening programme and the training of health workers to build local capacity and sustainability.

New appointment: International Regional Advisor for Western Pacific Professor Dr Looi Lai-Meng has been recently appointed as the International Regional Advisor for Western Pacific . Professor Lai-Meng is a distinguished Professor in the Department of Pathology, University of Malaya. Professor Lai-Meng is an Executive Committee Member at the InterAcademy Partnership for Health and a Past-President for the World Association of Societies of Pathology and Laboratory Medicine and also a Senior Fellow at Academy of Sciences Malaysia.
