We recently published the <u>College's three-year strategy</u> setting out our vision for promoting and advancing excellence in pathology.

Round-up

- I was delighted to follow up our work on staffing at the Royal College of Physicians roundtable events at the Labour and Conservative party conferences. We discussed challenges and what we need to help ease the current pressures and create a sustainable workforce.
- Jon Ashworth MP, Shadow Secretary of State for Health, covered our histopathology workforce census, <u>Meeting pathology demand</u>, during the Labour Party conference, highlighting the shortage of histopathologists. He also gave his support to the role of medical examiners and thanked pathologists, and other healthcare professionals, for their contribution to the NHS.
- It was a pleasure to attend the International Academy of Pathology meeting in Jordan and meet so many of our overseas fellows and trainees there. Our memorandum of understanding with the Arab Board Of Health Specializations is a very good step forward for our joint work.
- Lots of other acute work is going on around genetics, antibiotic resistance, training, undergraduates and work with international colleagues and other professional bodies. We will keep you posted.

NEWS FROM EXTERNAL ORGANISATIONS

Health Education England (HEE)Innovation Fund – Invitation to Tender Reducing the threat of antimicrobial resistance (AMR) remains high on the national agenda. HEE is expected to take forward a programme of work, in support of the Government's ambitions to halve healthcare associated Gramnegative blood stream infections and inappropriate antimicrobial prescribing by 2020/21, making use of effective diagnostic tests. This also includes an assessment of workforce needs in relation to infection prevention and control.

HEE has set up an AMR Innovation Fund to encourage and support initiatives that will contribute to workforce development in this area, through education and training, particularly around behaviour change with evidence of outcomes.

New NHS sepsis tool launched

The NHS has <u>launched a tool</u> that for the first time accurately measures the number of patients admitted to hospital who are at risk of sepsis. All hospitals across England are being asked to use the tool, which will allow them to identify how many patients are at risk of sepsis. As a result, the NHS will now be able to track improvements, such as rates of survival and length of hospital stays and the impact on patients locally, regionally and nationally. By showing the numbers of admissions, rates of survival and lengths of stay, it will give clinicians the clearest information yet for which types of infections can cause patients to deteriorate quickly, and which treatments are most effective at saving lives.

The <u>Suspicion of Sepsis (SOS) Dashboard</u> has been created by Imperial College Health Partners (ICHP) through the Patient Safety Collaborative, in collaboration with NHS Improvement and NHS England.

BMA Foundation for Medical Research

The BMA Foundation for Medical Research provides approximately £700,000 of research funding each year. Details of the 2019 grants have been confirmed and all grant categories are on the BMA Foundation website. Applications are invited from medical practitioners and research scientists.
