President's Messages of the Month

This has been a very hectic period and one with real challenges, not least for all our microbiology and virology members. In light of the COVID-19 outbreak, we have been looking at our <u>conferences</u> and exams to assess the impact on members on a day-to-day basis. Some overseas <u>exams have had to be cancelled</u>, and the exams team is working with trainees to support them and manage the situation.

You will see below some of the fantastic work that has being going on around quality and safety and other areas. We will update you on the trainees work around bullying and harassment in the next Bulletin, particularly highlighting the safety aspects of poor behaviour. We have also had excellent engagement around workforce with governments across the UK, and the haematology briefing, based on the result of our workforce survey completed recently, is a real help in this.

Haematology workforce briefing

Our new workforce briefing, <u>The haematology laboratory workforce: challenges and</u> <u>solutions</u>, highlights how haematologists are finding it increasingly difficult to undertake vital diagnostic work in the laboratory.

As demand and workloads increase haematology consultants need to be able to continue to provide diagnostic laboratory services, including interpretation of test results and liaison with other medical professionals. There needs to be a commitment by the NHS to support and expand these services and this will have implications for the workforce. We're promoting the need for expansion of medical and clinical scientist trainee and consultant numbers to Health Education England, the government and the devolved nations and this briefing will help us do this!

Patient Safety Awareness Week 8 - 14 March

I am delighted to announce that <u>Patient Safety Awareness Week</u> is underway. Organised and hosted by the College, the aim of the week is to raise awareness about patient safety and pathology services and is part of our work on quality.

There are many ways you can find out more, including watching videos, making a photo pledge and entering the essay competition. More resources are being released throughout the week.

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WORKING FOR MEMBERS

Learning Environment for Pathology Trainees (LEPT) system for CESR applicants The LEPT system is now open to Certificate of Eligibility for Specialist Registration (CESR) applicants to help them collect evidence. LEPT demonstrations

Deaneries/Local Education Training Boards (LETBs) are reminded that demonstration of the LEPT system can be arranged. The LEPT system is an ePortfolio for histopathology and chemical pathology (metabolic medicine) trainees. It is a place to record workplace-based assessments, including multi-source feedback (MSF), and can be used to support the Annual Review of Competence Progression (ARCP) process. The ePortfolio also provides Educational Supervisor Structured Reports (ESSRs), which gives a snapshot of a year's training that can inform the ARCP process. Pathology External Quality Assurance

The College has set up a new pathology wide External Quality Assurance (EQA) review programme to improve the governance and culture of pathology Quality Assurance (QA). The two-year collaborative programme supports the development of a robust framework for the system-wide governance and oversight of technical EQA including point of care testing (POCT).

We are looking for experienced professionals with expertise in the oversight and delivery of technical EQA including POCT and/or quality improvement, and patient safety to join our work-streams. There will be a minimum of four meetings (a mix of teleconference and face to face) per year, with actions progressed via e-mail between meetings. Medical Examiner Update

Tuesday 16 June 2020

This is the first annual Medical Examiner update meeting, bringing together national and regional leaders to discuss current issues. Topics include the impact on the coronial system, the challenges of implementation, the view from the Healthcare Safety Investigation Branch and Care Quality Commission, the regional structure, role of the Medical Examiner Officer and gross negligence manslaughter.

Coroner and Medical Examiner Training

The Chief Coroner and Judicial College have developed this training day for all Coroners and Medical Examiners in England and Wales, with support from the National Medical Examiner and the College.

This is a series of regional events taking place between March and June. Delegates are strongly encouraged to attend their regional event to take advantage of this opportunity to network and establish relationships with Medical Examiners and coroners in their local areas. However, if you are unable to attend the event for your region, you may attend a different one.

The course will cover:

- Understanding the role of the Medical Examiner and Coroner.
- When to refer a death to the Coroner,

- What a good MCCD looks like.
- How deaths are registered.
- How to deal with challenging situations.

There will also be small group discussions, exploring scenarios where close collaboration between Medical Examiners and Coroners is essential.

Although there will inevitably be some overlap, this training is different from the RCPath face-to-face-training and is suitable for all MEs.

Medical Examiners: face-to-face training

The College is the lead medical royal college for Medical Examiners, providing the essential training that will equip you with the knowledge and skills you will need for this important role. Any doctor wishing to work as a Medical Examiner will need to complete mandatory e-learning modules and attend a face-to-face training day. The day will include short presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience.

A certificate will be awarded to provide evidence of completion of the face-to-face component of the medical examiner training. This training complements the e-leaning which you must complete before attending this training. The College is inviting new medical examiners to join as members. This is dependent on completion of this training and evidence of satisfactory completion of the e-learning modules. Please note, it will be necessary to stay for the entire day to receive a certificate of completion of this training. You must have completed all 26 core e-learning modules before attending the face-to-face training.

Medical Examiner Officer training

The College is also leading on the training of Medical Examiner Officers. The training days are open to anyone who has been appointed, or is considering applying to work as an MEO.

MEOs work closely with Medical Examiners and will undertake tasks such as coordinating the completion of death certificates and referrals to the coroner, and speaking to clinicians and bereaved families. There is more information about the role of the MEO, including a <u>model job description</u>.

MEOs may come from a wide range of backgrounds. It is anticipated that many will be nurses, healthcare scientists or bereavement officers by background, although this list is not exhaustive.

This face-to-face training day is the second part of basic MEO training. Everyone attending the course must have completed the 26 mandatory core e-learning modules before the date of the course. It is vital that you have completed this preparatory work to enable you to get the most out of the training day. The e-learning <u>can be accessed</u> <u>here</u>.
