Contingency planning

As some of you will be all too acutely aware, there is a current problem with the supply of a key reagent for B12 analysis on one platform in some laboratories.

This is a timely reminder to have a think about the detail of your business continuity plans and consider undertaking an exercise to test those plans, especially should transport or supply issues affect specific reagent or consumable supplies. There has been a great deal of work by the Department of Health and NHS England with suppliers about their contingency plans in the event of import issues arising during British exit from the EU. But you will all be best placed to understand what your team and your suppliers will do in the event of particular items being in limited supply, and what your ordering schedule is and how it might be affected by delays in delivery.

There have also been interruptions in drug supplies over the last few years - Epipen being one of the last events, and contingency planning has been going on about this. To find out more about drug supply please follow the link Medicine supply update.

The pathology community is a strong and collaborative one, and work together at all times for our patients. Thank you for all you do!

Mapping our work - Launch of regional map

We are delighted to be able to launch to the first instalment of the <u>College's regional</u> <u>map</u>, which shows recent and upcoming activities the College has organised and supported across the UK.

Frontiers in Laboratory Medicine (FILM) Meeting

The annual <u>FILM</u> event took place in Birmingham, bringing together senior laboratory staff and managers across all pathology disciplines. I was very pleased to have the opportunity to contribute and to discuss workforce pressures and potential solutions and priorities for investment in laboratory medicine. A great event and fantastic community of practice!

Medical Examiners - new resources

Last month I highlighted the forthcoming roll-out of the Medical Examiner network in April. As the lead royal college we hosted a conference in Birmingham on implementing the medical examiner system. Dr Suzy Lishman provided a superb overview of all the great work. Dr Aidan Fowler, National Director of Patient Safety at NHS Improvement, gave updates including about the seven regional medical examiner leads who will provide a link between local medical examiners and the National Medical Examiner. Chief Coroner HHJ Mark Lucraft QC spoke about the key relationship between medical examiners and coroners. The Patients Association contribution was particularly valuable also. The College has also produced new-resources for members and commissioning bodies about becoming a medical examiner.

Medical examiners will initially start work in England and Wales. Dame Janet Smith, who oversaw the inquiry into the murders by Harold Shipman and who first recommended the introduction of medical examiners, has expressed concerns about the lack of such a <u>network in Northern Ireland.</u>

Workforce

We continue to advocate strongly for workforce support, for improved IT, for better workforce planning in the event of major changes (cytopathology for example!), and for a range of support for you all and for our future workforce. We had a very useful discussion with Professor Steve Powis about this, and will input into the workforce review to be chaired by Baroness Dido Harding. In the meantime, the analysis of the clinical biochemistry survey is being undertaken, and the laboratory haematology and transfusion survey has been sent out. Please complete these - we need the data to help you!

Round-up

- I attended a valuable meeting with Matt Hancock, Health and Social Care Secretary, and Baroness Dido Harding, Chair of NHS Improvement, with other medical royal colleges. We discussed the Long Term Plan, IT, workforce and prevention. There is a lot to do with good opportunities for joint working.
- Some excellent meetings have been taking place in different parts of the country with Dr Jonathan Kell, recently appointed Chair of the Wales Regional Council, meeting Dr Rob Orford, Chief Scientific Adviser for Health

in Wales, for wide ranging discussion on areas such as pathology workforce concerns. We are glad to see the issues of pay parity in training across the UK getting news coverage.

- I was delighted to chair a session at the Topics in Infection meeting hosted by the Royal Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene. Areas covered at the conference included the plague in Madagascar, monkey pox in the UK, emerging zoonoses, antimicrobial resistance, <u>One Health</u>, rabies, fungi, strep pyogenes and interprocess communication (IPC). Our pathology disciplines in infection and IPC in microbiology and virology are rising to a series of very tough challenges with fantastic professionalism and expertise!
- The Secretary of State's recent announcement about the sale of whole genome sequencing to healthy adults is a cause for concern and breaches a core-principle of the NHS by creating a two-tier access to services. I cosigned a letter to *The Times* expressing these concerns which was published with an accompanying article *Gene tests 'threaten core NHS principle'*. Other co-signatories included senior academics, Royal College of Physicians, Joint Committee on Genomics in Medicine, UK National Screening Committee, Clinical Genetics Society, and the Association of Genetic Nurses and Counsellors.

COLLEGE CONFERENCES AND SYMPOSIA

<u>Challenges in the Clinical Biochemistry Laboratory and Beyond</u> Thursday 28 February 2019

This one-day workshop will provide a multifaceted view of epigenetic profiling in adult and paediatric brain tumour diagnostics. The workshop will convey the biological principles of epigenetics in health and disease with a focus on brain tumours and explain how methylation profiles of brain tumours are detected with current array technologies. The day will be supplemented with an interactive practical session where participants will have the opportunity to discuss the diagnostic approach of challenging adult and paediatric CNS tumour cases.
