President's Message

Ockenden Maternity Review

The [Ockenden report](#) has highlighted shocking and distressing failures in maternity medical practice. It is yet another review of failing and inadequate NHS care which resulted in avoidable deaths, and our hearts go out to the affected families.

As the lead medical royal college for [medical examiners](#), we agree with the view that investigating stillbirths should be added to the remit of medical examiners and they should work with coroners to investigate stillbirths and neonatal deaths. This would help identify unusual patterns, such as high numbers of deaths at one hospital, which can be a strong indicator of poor care. A letter outlining the College's views [was published in The Times](#).

Further independent reviews, including those of maternity care at Nottingham University Hospitals and East Kent University NHS Foundation Trust, are due to report this year.

Clive Treacey Independent Review

This [review](#), commissioned by NHS England, looked at the circumstances leading up to Clive Treacey's death and the care he received from various organisations during his life. Dr David Bailey, Chair of College's Death Investigation Committee, led the first meeting of a Task and Finish Group to agree the best way to take forward the review's recommendations for pathology. We are working with Jane Hanna, Chief Executive of SUDEP Action, and representatives of the Learning Disability & Autism Programme, the National Medical Examiner's

office and the Chief Coroner's office; we will update members soon on the actions from this first meeting.

Northern Ireland elections

In May, the people of Northern Ireland will elect their representatives to the Northern Ireland Assembly. A new government will take responsibility for a range of devolved areas, including health services. The College Regional Council for Northern Ireland, with Dr Gareth McKeeman as Chair, has [published a set of priorities](#) for pathology services that we will be putting forward to the new government.

College influence

We were very pleased to see the influential House of Commons Public Accounts Committee report on [NHS backlogs and waiting times in England](#) feature College evidence highlighting pre-pandemic pathology workforce shortages.

We welcome the committee's recommendations for an assessment of the number of staff that will be available to deal with the backlog and how staff who have been working under intense and consistent pressure will be supported.

It was also gratifying to see the [Health and Social Care committee expert panel on cancer services](#) use much of our evidence on cancer services and workforce in their evaluation report.

Highlighted areas included concerns that certain specialties do not have enough staff in post to meet patient demand and that there have been workforce shortages for some time.

The evaluation also reflected our concerns about how the new Cancer Diagnostic Centres (CDCs) across England would be staffed, and how the capacity of the workforce would expand to match the investment in diagnostic pathways.

Stakeholders

- I had many useful and informative discussions as the IBMS Congress around improving diagnostics and pathology services with key stakeholders such as former Health Minister Lord Bethell and the IBMS President Debra Padgett.
- I attended an influential roundtable discussion on Tumour Agnostic policy and associated genomic issues hosted by the [PHG Foundation](#). It will highlight issues to policymakers & stakeholders to help improve patient care.

GMC National Training Survey

The General Medical Council's (GMC) 2022 national training survey gives trainees and trainers an opportunity to share their views on postgraduate training in the UK.

The survey is open until 3 May and the results will give the GMC, medical education bodies, and employers the data they need to check that trainees are receiving high-quality training, and that trainers are supported in their roles. This year's survey will also provide vital information about the ongoing impact of the pandemic on doctors' progression, work, and wellbeing.

You will hear from experienced consultants on a range of topics such as how to prepare a business case to secure resources, how to set up new services and how best to deal with complaints, and learn more about appraisal, revalidation and pension arrangements, among other areas. To register, you should ideally have been appointed to a consultant post within the last year or have passed FRCPath and/or made a successful CESR application and expect to be appointed to a consultant within the next year.

[Solving the Enigma of the Liver Biopsy – Virtual Event](#)

Following excellent feedback during our inaugural 'Solving the Enigma of the Liver biopsy' course in 2021, for 2022 we have revised the programme, aiming to cover other aspects within the specialty of liver pathology based on delegates' feedback. This virtual liver day is aimed at consultants and SAS who report liver biopsies as part of their everyday workload, and senior trainees who may wish to enhance their understanding of liver pathology.

This course should provide updates and advancements on areas of liver pathology which can sometimes be found more challenging, focusing predominantly on medical liver, but also briefly touching on neoplastic pathology with regards to the diagnosis of hepatocellular lesions. The invited speakers are all experts within their field. At the end of each session there will be an opportunity for delegates to ask questions.

Bitesize Liver Pathology webinar series

We are excited to announce the return of our bitesize liver pathology sessions for a second year. These will take place on Monday afternoons from 4.30–5.30pm, via zoom. This years' topics have been selected to cover different areas of the field of liver pathology and are based on delegate feedback from last year.

These one-hour webinars are mainly aimed at senior registrars but may also be of interest to SAS doctors and consultants who report liver biopsies occasionally as part of their everyday work. The aim is to provide attendees with the opportunity to view example digital slides before each session, followed by case-based discussions by an expert in the field. There will also be the opportunity for speakers to provide hints and tips to aid in diagnosis and interpretation, and for delegates to ask questions.

The College is the [lead medical royal college for medical examiners](#) and provides training for any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner. Participants will need to complete mandatory 26 e-learning modules and attend an entire face-to-face training day to receive a certificate of completion. The day includes short presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience. Medical Examiner Training is open only to medically qualified individuals who work in England and Wales.

Medical examiner officer training

The College also leads on the training of [medical examiner officers](#) (MEOs).

MEOs work closely with medical examiners and undertake tasks such as coordinating the completion of death certificates and referrals to the coroner, and speaking to clinicians and bereaved families.

MEOs may come from a wide range of backgrounds. For example, nurses, healthcare scientists or bereavement officers although this list is not exhaustive. More information, including a [model job description, is on the College website](#).

The face-to-face training day is the second part of MEO training. Everyone attending

News from external organisations

The COSTrans-MDRGNB study

You are invited to participate in an e-Delphi survey study to identify the most important outcomes to assess the impact of infection prevention and control interventions for prevention of transmission of multi-drug resistant gram-negative bacteria.

Clinical trials, systematic reviews and guidelines have compared various interventions for the prevention and control of MDRGNBs. However, studies on IPC measures often do not address the same outcomes, making it difficult to draw conclusions when the evidence is synthesised. If all studies in IPC used the same outcomes, they could all be compared and combined. When a set of main outcomes has been agreed for a health condition, it's called a 'core outcome set' (COS). A COS would help in bringing together all the studies to get a better understanding of which interventions are best and avoid the problem of some studies only reporting a selection of the outcomes that were measured.
