The single goal is to reduce patient harm from transfusion. The meeting launched the <u>2017 Serious Hazards of Transfusion (SHOT) report</u>, with important learning for everyone involved in transfusion. The haematologists, transfusion practitioners and transfusion scientists and the SHOT group are an absolute inspiration!

Our latest College #labtour took me for a couple of days to the brilliant teams at Wythenshawe Hospital and Manchester Royal Infirmary. Impossible to overstate what amazing work they are doing. Superb clinical pathology, laboratory pathology, innovation, and training, and a massive scale transformation programme, including lab refurbishment, that has meant movement of services from one site to another while maintaining service. Superb leadership at divisional and local service level and from the consultants, seniors and principals: they all say "the staff are amazing". I agree. 100%.

Listening to members

On the agenda

- I attended a moving and wonderful celebration of the 70th birthday of the National Health Service at Westminster Abbey. The pictures and tweets of local celebrations from across the nations were also deeply heartwarming. It is really good to celebrate the great work of our services!
- Patient safety: I spoke at the Health Service Journal Patient Safety Congress in Manchester with Dr Alan Fletcher and Professor Peter Furness, on how to ensure the successful roll-out of the medical examiners scheme and spread key learning from this. This programme is really important for relatives and many patient groups, as well as for us as healthcare professionals.

- Workforce and genomics: I had a useful meeting with the members of the PHG Foundation (a health policy think tank) about the All-Party Parliamentary Group on Personalised Medicine where we discussed how we could work together to showcase how central pathology is to personalised medicine in the NHS
- Workforce and cancer prevention: We brought together NHS England, NHS
 Improvement, Public Health England and other stakeholders where I discussed
 our concerns about current plans for HPV screening procurement. This was a
 helpful intervention, and there is now rapid work going on to look at how to
 answer some of the questions from the pretender discussions, and how to
 manage and minimise any risks to this vital service.

Cycle 100 miles for the College: Prudential RideLondon – Sunday 29 July 2018

Support College Fellow and Regional Council for Wales's member <u>Dr Jim Seale</u> at this year's Prudential RideLondon challenge, which is taking place on Sunday 29 July 2018, by visiting his fundraising page: https://mydonate.bt.com/fundraisers/jimseale1

Dr Seale will be cycling 100 miles from Surrey to London to raise much-needed funds to support the implementation and evaluation of a human papillomavirus (HPV) screening pilot project in Zimbabwe.

HPV is the cause of almost all cervical cancer cases and is responsible for an important fraction of other anogenital and head and neck cancers. Current

estimates indicate that every year in Zimbabwe 2,270 women are diagnosed with cervical cancer and 1,451 (64%) die from the disease. The pilot aims to reduce this mortality rate through the introduction of a screening programme and the training of health workers to build local capacity and sustainability.

New appointment: International Regional Advisor for Europe

Dr Monica Terlizzo's appointment was approved by the College Council when they met in June.

Dr Terlizzo will oversee her respective country advisor networks in the European region and input into the College's decision-making structure and processes.

She will also be an active member of the International Committee, which meets twice each year. Dr Terlizzo started her career in histopathology in 1995.

A member of the Royal College of Pathologists, she was appointed as a consultant histopathologist at Aintree University Hospital (AUH) in 2007 and became the lead pathologist for hepatobiliary, upper gastrointestinal pathology and dermatopathology. In 2016, she was appointed consultant histopathologist at Royal Marsden Hospital (London) where she works in the gastro and skin units.

She is involved in the implementation of digital pathology within the trust. Alongside her clinical experience, Dr Terlizzo took on the role of Designated Individual under the Human Tissue Act for AUH (2010–2014). In the final two years there, she was heavily involved in the merger of the pathology departments, ras clinical lead and representing the AUH histopathology medical staff. She was also Deputy Clinical Director for Liverpool Clinical Laboratories.

New appointment: Country Advisor for Ireland

Our international work relies on a strong network of regional and country advisors. We have the pleasure of announcing Professor Elaine Kay's appointment as the College Country Advisor for Ireland. Her appointment was approved by College Council when they met in June. Professor Elaine Kay is a consultant histopathologist and Professor of Academic Pathology at Beaumont Hospital, Dublin, and the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland.

She is a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland, the Royal College of Pathologists and the Royal College of Physicians of Ireland. Elaine has served as both Honorary Treasurer and Honorary Secretary of the Faculty of Pathology in Ireland. She has also served as National Specialty Director for histopathology training in Ireland and plays an active role in both undergraduate and postgraduate teaching and training.
