President's Messages of the Month

Celebrating RCPath Excellence Award Winners

It was a privilege and delight to host the RCPath Excellence Awards winners at the College's annual dinner last month. The winners were awarded for their contribution to education, patient safety, innovation in pathology practice and contribution to specialty. It was wonderful to be able to celebrate the amazing contribution pathologists and colleagues make to patient care. The winners combine dedication and commitment, going beyond the day-to-day to improve the working lives of their colleagues and the health and care of patients. You can read the citations on the College website. We will be aiming to spread some of the examples of great innovations and practice as exemplar case studies.

Devolved nation symposia and lab tours

I was delighted to be part of the College's regional council symposia both in Northern Ireland and in Wales. Both events provided valuable insights into pathology services in the devolved nations with some spectacular science on show, some of it, including the spread of the D68 enterovirus, areas which are rapidly emerging pathology. I also had the opportunity to meet many wonderful trainees across many of our disciplines.

My recent lab tours have taken me to meet the fantastic pathology teams at St Thomas's Hospital in London and the Personalised Medicine Centre of Excellence at Belfast City Hospital. I have also been to Glasgow to visit the amazing reproductive sciences team who have extraordinary expertise in fertility and preimplantation genetic diagnosis through embryo biopsy.

Blood cancers

Lots of work and activity on blood cancers this month, including the All Party Parliamentary Group on Blood Cancer with MP Nic Dakin and many blood cancer charities. I also attended the Myeloma UK steering group meeting in Birmingham, and

in collaboration with them we have added a series of 14 nursing best practice guides to the eCPD app to help nurse learning in myeloma. For our work on early diagnosis, see below, we have asked for their support in our workforce and IT investment.

Early Cancer Diagnosis

Learning from pathologists in many centres, across several nations has helped inform the specification for the roll out of Rapid Diagnostic Centres (RDC) and Cancer Alliances in England, and we have worked hard to ensure that pathology is prominent in this, including a specific mention of several of our specialties in the current draft, I have also highlighted the need for blood cancer detection to be included. We will also take this opportunity to roll out a update in lab test training pack for primary practitioners and RDC staff and patients, based on the Lab Test Online resource in parallel with this programme.

The Doctors Download digital conversation

The College is supporting *The Doctors Download* initiative. The <u>Academy of Medical Royal Colleges</u>, in partnership with the Professional Record Standards Body, has launched a UK wide online conversation, to engage the whole of the medical profession in a discussion about their digital experiences and expectations. The digital agenda in healthcare has the potential to improve the quality of patient care and doctors' working lives and environments. This study will help find out what is, and importantly what is not, working for doctors. You can take part here.

The independent review of gross negligence manslaughter and culpable homicide for the GMC

The review tackled issues that arose out of the death of Jack Adcock and the conviction of Dr Bawa-Garba for gross negligence manslaughter. It has sensible and important recommendations. The GMC accepted all recommendations within its remit, which is key for the future. The recommendations on expert witnesses are entirely in keeping with those in the joint work we have carried out with the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges in producing the <u>guidance for health professionals acting as expert witnesses</u>. This is reassuring and helpful.

Round-up

- I joined <u>Bowel Cancer UK</u> to deliver a 10,000 signature petition to 10 Downing Street asking the government to commit to <u>Lynch</u> syndrome testing for all bowel cancer patients and their families. The College has worked alongside Bowel Cancer UK to address challenges facing people affected by bowel cancer for many years. We're delighted that in April 2019 Wales committed to a national system of testing all bowel cancer patients for Lynch syndrome in line with clinical guidelines.
- We recently responded to the interim <u>NHS People's Plan</u> which was published with the aim of addressing workforce challenges across the NHS. To follow up, I met Baroness Dido Harding, Chair of NHS Improvement, who is leading on the plan, for a really good discussion about pathology specialties and the workforce. We're looking forward to working together on this and are also arranging a joint lab tour. We will continue to work with <u>NHS England</u>, <u>NHS Improvement</u> and <u>Health Education England</u> to press for the much needed support for the pathology workforce that our patients need and deserve.
- I had an opportunity to attend the launch of Evidence Week in parliament, organised by <u>Sense about Science</u> and hosted by Norman Lamb MP, Chair of

- the Science and Technology committee. The event highlighted the opportunity for close collaboration between researchers, scientists and parliamentarians and the importance of evidence-based policy making.
- <u>Patient safety bulletin 7</u> has been launched, with very valuable learning, and is also available on the eCPD app for documenting your learning! Very useful for portfolios and for appraisal.

<u>Getting to Grips with Genomics workshop – 17 and 18 July: Genomics for</u> Pathology Trainees

Wednesday 17 and Thursday 18 July 2019

To be held at the Royal College of Pathologists, 6 Alie Street, London, E1 8QT CPD credits: TBC

As genomic analysis becomes increasingly important in cancer diagnostics and precision medicine, there is a knowledge gap to fill in the clinical workforce. Supported by the College; CM-Path and Health Education England have linked with the US Training Residents in Genomics group to deliver a team-based learning programme developed to meet the training needs of pathologists. This will be combined with 'state-of-the-art' lectures on specific topics and an overview of the new NHS Genomic Medicine Service. There will be an opportunity to undertake a competency test following the workshop. This will be an interactive, hands-on, practical workshop that will empower you to embrace the exciting advances in molecular pathology.

The aim of this event is to introduce the RCPath best practice recommendations for digital pathology and explain digital pathology validation for primary diagnosis.

The Golden Hour Conference II - The pathology of traumatic injury

The second Golden Hour Conference once again brings together clinicians and others who are passionate about transforming outcomes for injured patients. Building on the success of last year's event, the team will bring together local and international experts who will help define the path to novel diagnoses and interventions. It is increasingly recognised that the opportunity to intervene in potentially preventable trauma deaths occurs in the pre-hospital and early emergency room phase.

Increasingly, services are working much more closely with coroners and pathologists and this is transforming our understanding of why our patients die.

As an additional section this year, the day will explore the golden hour within the context of major incidents and multiple patient events; learning lessons of best practice from around the world.

Medical Examiners, Face-to-face training

Event dates below.

Medical examiners will ensure accurate death certification across a local area, provide much-needed support for bereaved families and improve patient safety. Medical

examiners will be doctors registered with the GMC holding a current licence to practise. Any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner will need to attend a face-to-face training day and complete mandatory e-learning modules.

The Royal College of Pathologists, the lead medical royal college for medical examiners, is providing the essential training which will equip you with the knowledge and skills you will need for this important role. The day will include short presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience. The training has been trialled with experienced medical examiners from pilot or early adopter sites.

A certificate will be awarded to provide evidence of completion of the face-to-face component of the medical examiner training. This training complements the e-leaning which you must complete before attending this training. The College is inviting new medical examiners to join the Royal College of Pathologists. This is dependent on completion of this training and evidence of satisfactory completion of the e-learning modules. Important, it is necessary to stay for the entire day to receive a certificate of completion of this training. You must have completed all 26 core e-learning modules before attending the face-to-face training.
