## **President's Messages of the Month**

## Pathology lab tour

One of the more enjoyable opportunities of being a president of a medical royal college is that I get to meet members, both in the UK and abroad. I value the deeper understanding from these face-face meetings of the challenges we face as a profession as well as hearing about local issues.

I also get to see some great and innovative work. I want to build on what I have seen and learnt, so I have a made a personal goal to visit pathology departments in the UK, and to meet as many of our overseas fellows as possible. I am already shameless about popping in to departments to say hello, and will continue to do so if you will allow me in!

## Medical Examiners – One year to go

The recent conference on implementing medical examiners demonstrated a real commitme nt and eagerness from those attending to make sure this vital patient safety initiative is ready to go live in acute Trusts from April 2019, as a prelude to the expected full roll out to all healthcare settings.

Many trusts are already taking steps to make this happen. I heard first-hand accounts from medical examiners from across England and Wales who offered valuable insights in setting up a medical examiner programme. What was particularly striking is that they all reported high levels of

satisfaction with the system from bereaved families.

As the lead Royal College for medical examiners, we are working closely with the Medical Examiner Strategic Programme Board to support the development and rollout of a network of medical examiners, including developing a range of materials and resources such as curricula, training programmes and job descriptions.

## **Engaging stakeholders**

I recently met the Chair of the Science and Technology Committee, the Rt Hon Norman Lamb MP. We discussed how emerging technologies are changing pathology practice but will need IT investment. I also raised some of the challenges facing the pathology workforce.

I am also pleased to have a date in the diary to meet the Parliamentary and Health Service Ombudsman, Rob Behrens CBE, to discuss how the introduction of medical examiners will fit with the NHS's wider patient safety initiative.

Following this theme, I will be speaking at the conference; *Next steps for Improving Patient Safety in the NHS* on 26 April organised by the <u>Westminster Health Forum.</u>

# International Collaboration on Cancer Reporting Dataset Consultation (ICCR)

The draft ICCR datasets for the pathology reporting of <u>CNS and Head & Neck</u> are now available for review. The documents will be available for comments until Friday 4 May 2018.

## General Medical Council (GMC) - Annual Survey

The GMC has launched its annual national survey for doctors in training and trainers, which runs until Wednesday 2 May 2018. For this first time, the GMC will be asking a series of questions around wellbeing and the impact of tiredness and workload. The surveys are taking place at a challenging time for doctors and employers. A high response rate however, will provide vital, robust and comprehensive data about training posts and programmes. This data can then be used to measure the quality of postgraduate medical education and training, to help employers find out how doctors view the quality of training within their trust and any additional support required for trainers. A strong response is encouraged from both doctors in training and trainers to enable the GMC to improve their understanding of issues and how they can develop solutions and support.
