Volunteers' Week

This week marks <u>Volunteers' week</u> (1-7June) held to celebrate the diversity and breadth of contributions that volunteers make across the country.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the many College members who volunteer. They bring their energy, expertise and time to the College, ultimately helping to improve pathology services for the benefit of patients. Without them the College couldn't carry out its work.

We are always looking for new volunteers. Response to the Interim NHS People Plan

The <u>Interim NHS People Plan</u> was published on 3 June with the aim of addressing workforce challenges across the NHS. You can read my <u>statement in response to the plan on the College website.</u>

Medical examiners

Since the start of the year <u>training sessions to become a medical examiner</u> have been held across England and Wales. Open to all medical specialties and senior trainees, more sessions are planned for later in the year and there are still places left for the <u>face-to-face training in Leeds</u> which is being held later this month.

I thoroughly recommend the training which I have attended, and I am now a fully qualified medical examiner! We have also launched a separate new membership

category and the RCPathME post nominal for our <u>medical examiners</u> on successful completion of their training.

An update on NHS England Cervical Screening Programme (CSP)

Following our previous announcement in April that NHS England confirmed it will formalise contracts with bidders in respect of seven of the nine lots, we have had a further update in relation to Lots 1 (London) and 2 (North East). For further information please see <u>NHS England HPV Screening Procurement Update</u>. We continue to press for improvements in the processes around commissioning, in workforce planning and in IT supporting our key cytopathology colleagues.

Rapid Diagnostic Centres

We have been advising on the panel of tests for the expansion of these centres across England, with learning from pilots and the centres in Wales. We have also advised that they should include blood cancers and that they should all have a clinical biochemist as a core part of the team!

Round-up

- I was pleased to see following a consultation which the College contributed to, that the <u>Migration Advisory Committee</u> has published a review giving recommendations of professions to be added to the <u>Shortage Occupation List</u> including medical practitioners and biochemists. These categories cover the majority of the College specialties which will make it easier for pathology services to recruit from overseas.
- Prof Sir Mike Richards published his <u>interim report on cancer screening services</u> following a call for evidence. I am pleased to say that the College advice, through our workshop on cancer screening and in our response to the call for evidence, has been heeded in the report. Workforce planning, procurement, impact on existing services and the financial consequences of implementation are key.
- I was delighted to join the <u>Blood Cancer Alliance</u> to discuss workforce concerns and the role pathologists in diagnosing blood cancer. I also met Gemma Peters, CEO of <u>Bloodwise</u> to talk about ways to help early diagnosis of blood cancers, and support for the haematology, histopathology and transfusion workforce. We're looking forward to working together, particularly during Blood Cancer Awareness month in September.
- At the <u>European Congress on Digital Pathology 2019</u> I presented on the importance of training needed when implementing the use of artificial intelligence in clinical practice, and there are some interesting developments including a move to 'handcrafted' AI, moving from a 'black box' approach.
- I really enjoyed meeting so many talented and innovative pathologists on my #labtour to the Viapath pathology labs at St Thomas's Hospital. I was also pleased to see their planned investment in advanced practitioners. These visits really help us to get a picture of life on the ground for all our specialties, and to understand how we can help press for investment and support for all our pathologists.

Foundation Taster Day

Saturday 29 June 2019 CPD credits: TBC

To be held at the Royal College of Pathologists, 6 Alie Street, London, E1 8QT The newly launched Foundation Taster Scheme is an exciting opportunity for foundation doctors to explore pathology careers. It combines a regional clinical taster day with an event in the College's new building. The event is sponsored by the British Division of the International Academy of Pathology (BDIAP). Participants will be able to meet consultants and trainees from each of the major specialties to talk to them about their work, what training involves and the variety of opportunities available for trainees. In addition, they will receive advice about the application process and how to be successful at interview, as well as how to pursue academic and research opportunities in pathology. There will be a chance to put pathology specialties to the test: can they help diagnose what is wrong with the mystery patient who is unconscious in the park? There will also be the chance to submit a pathology-related poster and win a prize of £100 from the Association of Clinical Pathologists (ACP). Delegates will be given support to organise their own clinical taster day in a specialty of interest.

<u>Getting to Grips with Genomics workshop – 17 and 18 July: Genomics for</u> <u>Pathology Trainees</u>

Wednesday 17 and Thursday 18 July 2019

To be held at the Royal College of Pathologists, 6 Alie Street, London, E1 8QT CPD credits: TBC

As genomic analysis becomes increasingly important in cancer diagnostics and precision medicine, there is a knowledge gap to fill in the clinical workforce. Supported by the College; CM-Path and Health Education England have linked with the US Training Residents in Genomics group to deliver a team-based learning programme developed to meet the training needs of pathologists. This will be combined with 'state-of-the-art' lectures on specific topics and an overview of the new NHS Genomic Medicine Service. There will be an opportunity to undertake a competency test following the workshop. This will be an interactive, hands-on, practical workshop that will empower you to embrace the exciting advances in molecular pathology.

Getting to Grips with Genomics workshop: Training the Trainer, 17 July – morning session

The aim of this event is to introduce the RCPath best practice recommendations for digital pathology and explain digital pathology validation for primary diagnosis.

Medical Examiners, Face-to-face training

Event dates below.

Medical examiners will ensure accurate death certification across a local area, provide much-needed support for bereaved families and improve patient safety. Medical examiners will be doctors registered with the GMC holding a current licence to practise. Any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner will need to attend a face-to-face training day and complete mandatory e-learning modules.

The Royal College of Pathologists, the lead medical royal college for medical examiners, is providing the essential training which will equip you with the knowledge and skills you will need for this important role. The day will include short presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience. The training has been trialled with experienced medical examiners from pilot or early adopter sites.

A certificate will be awarded to provide evidence of completion of the face-to-face component of the medical examiner training. This training complements the e-leaning which you must complete before attending this training. The College is inviting new medical examiners to join the Royal College of Pathologists. This is dependent on completion of this training and evidence of satisfactory completion of the e-learning modules. Important, it is necessary to stay for the entire day to receive a certificate of completion of this training. You must have completed all 26 core e-learning modules before attending the face-to-face training.
