Examination regulations - 2021

CERVICAL CYTOPATHOLOGY

These regulations must be read in conjunction with the *Regulations and Guidelines – College examinations for Fellowship and Diplomas*.

ENTRY & TRAINING REQUIREMENTS

Changes to the FRCPath in Histopathology have meant that candidates undertake basic training in cytopathology, but can then opt out of higher training in cervical cytopathology (and autopsy practice), and gain Fellowship through surgical histopathology and non-gynae cytopathology alone. The opt-out option occurs after part B of training

The introduction of a separate cervical cytopathology examination is intended for candidates who wish to carry on and pursue higher training in Cervical Cytopathology under the new curriculum (2010). Successful completion of this component will result in the award of the Certificate in Higher Cervical Cytopathology Training (CHCCT).

STRUCTURE AND FORMAT OF THE EXAMINATION

Candidates who wish to attempt the specialist cervical cytopathology exam must notify the RCPATH when the announcement of dates for that diet is made. At this time, candidates will be required to indicate their wish to sit the examination using one of two liquid based preparation systems – ThinPrep or SurePath. No other options will be available.

The examination will be held in a single centre over the course of a single day.

The morning paper

Twenty single slide cases will be provided in 10 pairs in 20 minute slots over a period of 3hrs and 20 minutes on the morning of the examination. For each case a short history including the age of the patient, the stage of the menstrual cycle if known and any previous abnormal cervical cytology will be provided. Additional information may be provided if appropriate. Cases will be a mix of negative and abnormal slides. Candidates will be expected to provide a brief description of the findings on the slide and to make an appropriate management recommendation based on the clinical history and the findings on the slide. It is expected that candidates will use the terminology of the NHS Cervical Screening Programme and management suggested should be in line with current guidelines that do allow for some local variations in practice.

The afternoon paper

The second paper for this examination will consist of a two hour written paper. The questions may include an understanding of the management of a cervical cytology laboratory participating in the National Health Service Cervical Screening Programme (NHSCSP), changes and developments within the NHSCSP, and interpretation of statistical data regarding individual and laboratory performance.

It should be noted that candidates will be expected to use standard NHS Cervical Screening Programme terminology and management recommendations.

Timings

The examination will be held annually in the Autumn session.
