President's Messages of the Month

It has been a very busy period for the College, with enormous activity across curriculum work, exams, and work with the General Medical Council (GMC). To all those involved, including our examiners, many, many thanks.

Lots of activity around workforce also - is really good to see an emphasis on flexibility in discussions with Health Education England (HEE) and the GMC, in terms of making life easier for those in training and those wishing to achieve specialist registration - we will see what will come out, but we have hope!

Our health priorities for the next government

As the date of the election draws near, we have been highlighting our key <u>health</u> <u>priorities for the next government</u>.

The priorities are:

- investing in pathology workforce for patient care
- investing in pathology IT and infrastructure
- equitable and accessible genomic testing
- a solution for pensions issues.

Once the new government is in place, we will follow up with communications to ministers and MPs to ensure that pathology services are a key priority.

NHS pension arrangements for doctors and senior clinicians

The current pension arrangements for doctors have led to some consultants reducing their hours or taking early retirement. This is affecting patient care and making pressures on pathology services – which already face acute workforce shortages – even worse. It is crucial that our experienced clinicians continue working in the health service. We welcome proposals from the NHS in England to reimburse

pension tax paid by doctors undertaking extra work for the NHS but we call on the next government to implement a long-term UK-wide solution for the benefit of patients.

Microbiology/Virology Workforce Survey – Deadline: 20 December 2019
We need you to contribute and help to shape the planning of the future workforce by encouraging your clinical lead/head of department to complete the microbiology and/or virology survey.

We need this information to provide an accurate picture to influence and lobby policy makers and parliamentarians on your behalf. The survey results provide us with a comprehensive snapshot of the UK medical and scientific workforce. We also need to obtain a realistic idea of the number of vacant posts. The resulting data will be used as aggregated statistics to make a strong case.

Round-up

- I was really pleased to host Dr Ifeoma Ijei, our first secondee from the ARISE project, and the ARISE General Assembly at the College. The aim of the ARISE project is to improve laboratory diagnosis and quality assurance systems for population screening for <u>sickle cell</u> disease in newborn babies and infants in sub-Saharan Africa.
- The College fully supports a new report from the Royal College of Physicians, <u>Benefiting from the Research Effect</u>, which outlines how trusts can take practical steps to ensure clinicians are supported in embedding research into clinical and laboratory practice. We know that healthcare organisations which undertake research benefit from the 'research effect' and provide better care and outcomes for patients.
- I was in Newcastle for <u>National Pathology Week</u> (NPW) and had a fantastic lab tour at <u>Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Gateshead</u> with amazing teams and great facilities. I was also delighted to speak at the NPW event *Path to Success* organised by the College and <u>Health Education England</u>. There was also an interactive *Pathology Battle*, a poster competition and application and interview advice. Around 60 trainees and students met 20 enthusiastic pathologists to encourage them to choose pathology as their future career.
- We held a lively <u>Discover Pathology Careers</u> event as part of NPW for students and foundation doctors at the College. This introduced school students, undergraduates and foundation doctors to the diversity of both human and veterinary pathology through interactive talks and networking sessions involving around 20 College members. Cllr Victoria Obaze, Speaker of the local council (Tower Hamlets) also joined us. She spoke about the inspiring work of pathologists, and told attendees 'you could be the future of pathology.'
- The College organised <u>International Pathology Day</u> at the College on 13 November. Packed full with fantastic talks and a roundtable event from <u>The Pathologist</u>, the atmosphere was buzzing as we shared experiences and celebrated advances in rapid and diagnostic testing.
- It was my pleasure to be able to join the RCPath Scotland Regional Council at their symposium in Aberdeen. It was great to be with such an expert, enthusiastic group. We had some very constructive discussions around the tough issues that pathology services are facing. The event was a great

success, with 90 delegates and super feedback. Many thanks to Prof Peter Johnston and Jessica Zago for their fantastic organisation of this.

• The College hosted the <u>Cancer Research UK-Science and Technology Facilities Council Innovation Workshop</u> this month. Early diagnosis of cancer is vital if we are to improve survival rates for our patients – the theme of this three-day workshop was applying artificial intelligence techniques to digital pathology images for cancer early detection. Teams who successfully pitched proposals at the workshop will receive seed-funding for one year to cover the costs of pilot/feasibility studies. It was an intense and hugely productive and inspiring few days.

Liver biopsy in the assessment of medical liver disease

This slide-based practical workshop is devised for consultants working outside specialist liver centres, and trainees in stage C or D who have an interest in liver pathology. It is designed to complement the annual course 'Liver biopsy in the assessment of medical liver disease', but also works as a standalone course.

Medical examiners: face-to-face training

Medical examiners will ensure accurate death certification across a local area, provide much needed support for bereaved families and improve patient safety. Medical examiners will be doctors registered with the GMC holding a current licence to practise.

Any doctor wishing to work as a medical examiner will need to attend a face-to-face training day and complete mandatory e-learning modules.

The College is the lead medical royal college for medical examiners, providing the essential training which will equip you with the knowledge and skills you will need for this important role. The day will include short presentations, small group discussions of case scenarios and the opportunity to share experience. The training has been trialled with experienced medical examiners from pilot or early adopter sites.

A certificate will be awarded to provide evidence of completion of the face-to-face component of the medical examiner training. This training complements the e-leaning which you must complete before attending this training. The College is inviting new medical examiners to join as members. This is dependent on completion of this training and evidence of satisfactory completion of the e-learning modules. **Please note** – It will be necessary to stay for the entire day to receive a certificate of completion of this training. You must have completed all 26 core e-learning modules before attending the face-to-face training.

Medical examiner officer training

The College is leading on the training of medical examiners and has recently also agreed to provide training for medical examiner officers (MEOs). The training days are open to anyone who has been appointed, or is considering applying to work as an MEO.

MEOs work closely with medical examiners and will undertake tasks such as coordinating the completion of death certificates and referrals to the coroner, and speaking to clinicians and bereaved families. There is more information about the role of the MEO, including a <u>model job description</u>.

MEOs may come from a wide range of backgrounds. It is anticipated that many will be nurses, healthcare scientists or bereavement officers by background, although this list is not exhaustive.

This face-to-face training day is the second part of basic MEO training. Everyone attending the course must have completed the 26 mandatory core e-learning modules before the date of the course. It is vital that you have completed this preparatory work to enable you to get the most out of the training day. The e-learning <u>can be accessed here</u>. (Registration with e-Learning for Healthcare is required).
